# Manager's Corner



As the summer months approach, many of you will be spending all or part of your summer away from your Grayhawk home either at another house you own or on an extended vacation. I don't blame you for wanting to get out of the heat in Scottsdale, but please remember to keep your Grayhawk neighbors in mind while you are away. By that I mean remember that many of your neighbors live in Grayhawk year round and please be considerate of them while you

While you are gone this summer, if you do not have a landscaping service taking care of your yard, please be sure to have someone keeping an eye on your property. The summer months are the prime growing season in the southwest desert and yards that are not looked after can become overgrown and filled with weeds in a short period of time. Also, overgrown

desert trees, like the mesquite and palo verde, that are not routinely trimmed or crown thinned can become top heavy and are susceptible to being blown over during our summer monsoon storms. Usually, if a tree is blown over during a storm, the damage to the tree's roots requires that the tree be removed.

The Grayhawk Community Association (GCA) office also frequently is notified of a vacant house during the summer with an irrigation leak or flooding in the rear yard. When this happens, we will do everything we can to contact the homeowner, but unfortunately we do not always have accurate phone numbers or emergency contact information in our homeowner records. Homeowners occasionally change their e-mail address or get a new cell phone number but forget to notify the association office. I strongly encourage not only our seasonal residents, but all of you to make sure your contact information is up to date with the GCA office. Feel free to call the GCA office if you have any questions

Also, if you know that your neighbor is going to be away for the summer or on vacation for a couple weeks, please regarding this matter. do the neighborly thing and keep an eye on the house for them. While we do our best to keep businesses from soliciting throughout Grayhawk, occasionally some business information is put on the front doors. If this happens to a house that you know is not occupied during the summer, please remove these fliers and materials from the front door or elsewhere on the property. Leaving this type of information on a front door for an extended period of time can identify a house as

By making sure someone is looking after your Grayhawk house while you are away this summer, and by looking vacant to a potential thief. after each other's house all year long we can continue to make Grayhawk a safe and well cared for community.

# Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting - March 4, 2019

### **Homeowner Forum**

A homeowner from Peregrine inquired about when a common area wall in the Peregrine Villas neighborhood was going to be patched and repainted. She also asked about dead shrubs, noting that she had contacted the City of Scottsdale and they had notified her it was not NAOS. Michael Fee noted that the wall was already slated to be patched and painted in March or April and said he will look into the landscaping issue.

### **Development Committee**

David Van Omen reported that the City of Scottsdale will be sending out notification regarding the Rawhide Flood Plain Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) approval by FEMA once it becomes official which is currently scheduled to be on June 14. Michael Fee noted that the City of Scottsdale did not want the GCA to notify homeowners until after the LOMR approval has been officially approved by FEMA and the City of Scottsdale.

Margo Bellock asked what the status was with the Reata Wash Flood Plain, and whether or not there was a possibility those homes might be removed from the flood plain. Michael Fee said it is possible as Darrel Wood had been hired by the City of Scottsdale regarding this issue and that is anticipated that process will likely take at least five years mainly because there is currently no funding for the previously recommended repairs and mitigation in the flood

plain. It was noted that Rawhide Wash Flood Plain LOMR approval was successful mainly due to the money and work put in by the Vi at Silverstone prior to Grayhawk's involvement in this issue.

### **Operational Review Committee**

Richard Zielinski reported that there was not a meeting in February.

### **Landscape Committee**

Arlene Smith reported that the committee did meet in February. Janet Dempsey explained at the meeting that DLC Resources has implemented a new RGIS System, (an inventory identification system) enabling everyone within their company to see and verify specific details or projects in Grayhawk. Field crews can see on their Ipads where and what type of plants are to be planted, where irrigation lines are located, trees to be replaced or pruned, etc.

The committee has three proposals from DLC Resources that will be going to the Community Enhancement Committee. Information regarding those projects will be submitted to the Board of Directors at a future meeting.

Committee member Victoria Kauzlarich suggested and submitted a plant palette to enhance Grayhawk's Monarch Butterfly Garden project thus enabling Grayhawk to be identified as a Monarch Butterfly Waystation.

The Operational Review Committee and management recommended GCA Board approval of the project management proposal submitted by Barry Ebert from Santa Fe Management.


A motion was approved to accept Barry Ebert's Proposal at a cost of \$875.00 per month for approximately eight months.

# What You (Probably) Don't Know About The 19th Annual Phoenix Film Festival Rich Fowler, Renaissance Homeowner, Phoenix Film Festival volunteer since 2008

Over the past twenty years the Phoenix Film Festival (PFF) has grown from a modest, three-day event to one of the top 20 film festivals in the country. The festival takes place this year from April 4-14 at Harkins Scottsdale 101.

It all began at the turn of the century when a few independent filmmakers from Phoenix teamed up to create a public forum for local filmmakers to present their work. That first festival was held at the Arizona Center's AMC Theater in the spring of 2001, spanned three nights and two days and included 35 short and feature length films. The organizers planned to hold a one-time event, but when more than 3,000 people showed up (they had expected 500) the festival morphed into an annual affair.

In 2004 the Fourth Annual Phoenix Film Festival moved from downtown Phoenix to its current venue at Harkins Scottsdale 101, partly to accommodate a burgeoning attendance that would exceed 10,000. The festival program had also grown to more than 100

screenings, and the schedule evolved from three days to an eightday celebration of independent filmmaking.

Over the years, the festival has grown far beyond its original purview – shorts and feature length – with a full range of offerings: animated shorts, showcase features, documentaries (both short and medium length), world cinema, college shorts, and Arizona-made films, along with several categories of Horror and Sci-Fi.

A "Unified by Film" Program was added in 2017 to spotlight films from Native American, African American and Latino Filmmakers. Last year that program expanded to include LGBT films and a collection of cinematic works from Women Directors.

Today the festival serves not only Arizona's interest in independent filmmaking, but the country and the international community as well. Its schedule encompasses eleven days (spanning two weekends) and proffers 175 films spread over 300 viewings on seven screens. More than 30,000 people are expected to attend along with 100 filmmakers, directors and actors.

### **OTHER PARTICULARS:**

In 2004 Jason Carney was named the festival's permanent director. He still holds that position and has been the driving force behind the ever-evolving size, scope and international acclaim that the festival enjoys.

In 2005 The PFF spawned the International Horror and Sci-Fi Film Festival. It began as a stand-alone event until merging with the PFF in 2010.

This year the PFF has secured more than 250 volunteers to work the festival, starting daily as early as 9 a.m. and ending as late as midnight.

In addition to the best of today's independent films, the festival offers a Party Pavilion, film seminars, panel discussions, an Arizona Student Film Festival, Kid's Day, Educational Outreach and special events -- all at one location, the Harkins Scottsdale 101.

Two Oscar nominated films "RBG" and "First Reformed" were premiered in Arizona at the PFF in 2018. Recently, MovieMaker Magazine named The Phoenix Film Festival as "One of the 25 Coolest Film Festivals in the World."

The Phoenix Film Festival is a production of the Phoenix Film Foundation – a 501c3 non-profit – that supports the development of artistic appreciation, educational opportunities and growth of independent film within Arizona.

# Our Desert, Our Home



# **Confusion Rains...**and confusion reigns! Wait. What?

Remember October? Desert plants do. We got more rain in October than we do in a normal winter and by the time we got to winter, plants thought it was spring and, well, that's when confusion set in. Plants' normal growth and

bloom cycles have been thrown off by months.

Drought-deciduous Ocotillo celebrated October's rains by holding on to their leaves far longer than normal. Brittle Bush were in full bloom in December and are still at it as I write this in March. Creosote never lost their leaves, have bloomed and are holding on to their fuzzy fruit. I even saw a few Palo Verdes trying to bloom in December.

Since summer, we've gotten about 15" of rain - as much as we normally get in 2 years. It helps that our natural desert soil drains/infiltrates quickly. But temperatures have also remained low – slowing soil evaporation and plants' transpiration as well.

The short-hand expression for this combination is evapotranspiration and, well into March, that moisture-retention trend looks like it did during winter. Normally, as we move into spring, evapotranspiration accelerates. Not this year. With temperatures remaining low and rainfall much higher than normal, plants are likely to remain confused for some time.

Unsurprisingly, problems are beginning to surface. Some plants are showing signs of white powdery mildew on their leaf surfaces. Other plants are dying back from too much moisture that has lasted way too long. Still other plants - succulents mostly - won't show evidence of damage until later when their roots rot and the plant dies from the ground, up.

Clearly, nature's challenges have been formidable. Making matters worse are a couple of things most of us overlook.

### **ROOF RUNOFF**

A single inch of rain on 1,000 square feet of roof produces 600 gallons of water. I have some plants that have had more rain than they can stand. Despite an irrigation system that has not run for months and despite soil that infiltrates well and quickly, plants under the roofline have not had the chance to dry out. For the record, I'm not advocating gutters. I prefer that roof runoff restore ground water which is vital to a healthy ecosystem.

Plants under roof lines have been inundated with no long-term relief. Recall that desert plants love deep watering followed by long periods of dryness. The combination of repeated rains and little opportunity to dry out has stressed plants' root systems.

### SET IT AND FORGET IT IRRIGATION SYSTEMS

Most desert plants do not actively grow during the winter months and don't need water during this period. In fact, watering during the winter can actually harm plants (see references to root rot, above).

If we get an excessive amount of rain, AND your irrigation system has continued to run, AND you've got plants under your roof line - well you get the idea.

It's wise to get in the habit of turning off your irrigation system around Thanksgiving and then turn it on again in mid-February. Normal winter rains will take care of your plants. If they start to look a little droopy, turn your system on for an hour. You could even do this every couple of weeks through the winter but irrigating multiple times a week throughout the winter months is not helpful and may prove deadly - to your plants, that is.

### THE NEED TO REPRODUCE

All plants are hardwired to propagate. And, given the right set of conditions, they'll go nuts. Remember the Brittle Bush example above? Well, since they've been blooming for months on end, their flowers have been releasing seeds for months on end, too. Normally, these plants bloom for about a month or so in the spring. This year?

Three months and counting. I'm pretty sure there are now millions more Brittle Bush than there were at this time last year.

These confusion rains also have weeds propagating at warp speed. Some weeds, like Poa grass can lay in wait, underground, for as long as five years. Then when conditions are just right, up they come and they just keep coming. This year's Poa has been epic.

That said, plants' need to reproduce has led to a nice surprise and you can find it at the Deer Valley Wash trail.

### **DEER VALLEY WASH TRAIL**

One of Grayhawk's truly hidden treasures, is this difficult-to-find path maintained by Grayhawk. It is flat, well-groomed, runs east and west and can be found at Deer Valley Road, just east of Hayden.

The trail and the wash are bounded on the north by Los Gatos and on the south by Grayhawk's Serenity neighborhood.

The surprise is located about halfway to Pima Road on the south side of the trail. Some previously-lonely orange Globe Mallow have abundantly seeded themselves there. What used to be two plants now number in the hundreds. You'll recall that these are a favorite nectar plant of Monarch butterflies. You owe it to yourself to find this trail and take a lovely walk that is even lovelier thanks to our confusion rains.

**Correction:** Last month's column incorrectly identified the common name for the plant of the month. The Acacia *stenophylla* is commonly called the Shoestring Acacia, not Ocotillo. We regret the error.

# Window Replacement Reminder

There has recently been a significant sales push happening in the valley and particularly in Scottsdale by window replacement companies with offers of special financing and sales materials using verbiage that suggests or implies pre-approvals by the homeowners association.

Please note that all window replacement projects on single-family houses in Grayhawk require the PRIOR review and approval of the Architectural Review Committee. As owners, you may wish to upgrade to a more energy efficient window or replace aging, weather-worn windows. There are a few things to consider if you plan to replace your windows.

The Architectural Review Committee has never "preapproved" any product or contracting company to do window replacements in Grayhawk.

All window replacements must be approved by the Architectural Review Committee prior to installation. It is advisable to seek this approval PRIOR to making any down payment to a window sales person.


Per Grayhawk's Design Guidelines, all windows are required to match the existing style of the original windows.

This includes the material, color and frame and mullion patterns, etc., as well as the original construction techniques. This will likely involve cutting into the adjacent stucco wall to remove the old window and then install the new window.

In the opinion of the Architectural Review Committee, the "over framing" or "over-fit trim" techniques which do not require the removal of the old window and do not match the look of the existing windows. There are many high-pressure sales window replacement companies working in the area that only offer the over-fit trim product and therefore, their product will not be approved by the Architectural Review Committee.

Before making a final decision, the association would recommend getting input and proposals from 2-3 window contractors. The window replacement market is very competitive and 2-3 bids may result in a better product and/or better pricing.

# Low Water-Use Plants for Spring

In a hot, dry climate, we are always looking for ways to conserve water. Conserving water in your yard is a great way to save water without compromising on a beautiful landscape. Fortunately, so many of our stunning, desert-adapted plants require very little water.

Now that spring has arrived and temperatures are heating back up, it's a great time to get your summer garden ready. If you are considering trying to create a low water-use garden there are many excellent choices available.

You may typically think of cactus and succulents as low wateruse plants. However, there are also plenty of flowering shrubs that thrive in our dry desert climate. While cacti require the least amount of water, they do not always provide the same amount of color and soft texture that many shrubs do. Desert-adapted shrubs bring seasonal color, while still taking up less water than non-desert adapted plants.

A combination of both cactus and desert-adapted shrubs makes for a more beautiful and dynamic desert landscape. Mixing different colored blooms can also be a fun way to get creative in your space.

The following shrubs are an extensive, however, not exhaustive list of low water-use plants we recommend for your desert landscape:

- Baja Fairy Duster: This shrub is medium to large size and produces red, plume-like flowers. Pink Fairy Duster is another great option if you are looking for a different colored bloom.
- **Blue Bells** (*Eremophila hygrophana*): These shrubs can range from a small to medium size. Though they are named Blue Bells, you might consider their small flowers to be closer to a light purple.

- Valentine Sage: The Valentine sage is best known for having great winter color, usually being the first to bloom around February. They are medium sized and provide red flowers.
- Chuparosa: Chuparosa is another medium sized shrub. It produces red and orange tubular flowers.
- Tecoma Stans: These shrubs grow to be large and tall.
   Different Tecoma varieties grow yellow, orange, or orange-red flowers. Their trumpet-like flowers are also a great treat for hummingbirds.
- Bougainvillea species: Bougainvillea are usually spotted with bright pink blooms. My two personal favorite types are the Barbara karst, which is a large, trellis type bush, and the

Torch Glow which is large with upright branches. Its branches grow blooms at the top making them appear like bright, flaming torches.

- Chihuahuan Sage: The Chihuahuan Sage ranges from medium to large size. It has loose, spiky branches that are often covered in small, light purple flowers. It can also be found in a white variety.
- Baja Ruellia: This shrub is small to medium in size. It grows in a naturally rounded shape and produces purple flowers.
- **Golden Eye:** The Golden Eye is usually a dense green shrub but produces bright, daisy-like yellow flowers in the spring.

- Lantanas: Lantanas come in many different colors and are great as ground cover plants or used as smaller shrubs.
- **Salvia Clevelandii:** This shrub is a fragrant sage with purple flowers. It grows to be a large size.
- Coral Fountain: Also known as the Firecracker Bush, this shrub has grass-like stems. Its cascading, vibrant red and coral blooms create the appearance of a fountain or falling firecracker.

Jennifer and I have eaten at several breakfast places, but Breakfast Kitchen Bar was definitely one of our favorites. The menu is huge and features tons of delicious options. On our visit, Jennifer ordered the Gyro Breakfast Bowl. It was two hash brown cakes, gyro meat, tomatoes, onions and parsley topped with two sunny side up egg and tzatziki sauce. I thought it was an odd combination, but Jennifer said it was delicious and the perfect combination of breakfast and lunch.

I couldn't decide between the Breakfast Quesadilla and the Breakfast Tacos. But our server came to the rescue. She recommended the Breakfast Tacos because she loved the pulled pork. She wasn't wrong! The tacos featured scrambled eggs, pulled pork, avocado relish, black bean relish on top of two corn tortillas with a side of ranchero sauce and hash brown cakes. It was a generous serving of pulled pork on both tortillas. I was only able to eat one taco and took the other one home along with one hash brown cake. Prior to us getting our meal, we ordered the Amazing Avocado Fries that were served with sriracha aioli. They were unique and quite delicious. Since we couldn't finish all the fries, I took them home as well.

The restaurant is open daily for breakfast, lunch and brunch. They offer unexpected and mouthwatering options like the Steak and Eggs Benedict, Croissant French Toast, Blueberry Protein Pancakes, a Lobster Omelet, Chicken and Waffle Hash, and Breakfast Pizzas. They also offer a variety of sandwiches and salads. The children's menu includes kid friendly choices like the S'mores Waffle and Cinnamon French Toast stuffed with Peanut Butter and Jelly.

All of the food is made using the "freshest and most responsible ingredients possible," including cage free eggs and local grass-fed cattle. Plus, their healthy options are plentiful for both adults and kids. They offer vegetarian, vegan and gluten free options, as well as a keto menu. Their drink menu includes bubbles and caffeinated drinks, signature cocktails, beer, specialty coffee drinks, and red and white wine.

I'd recommend stopping by the Breakfast Kitchen Bar for a great brunch, or even better, make it your spot for Easter brunch. You won't be disappointed.
