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Manager's Corner



At the November 4, 2019 Grayhawk Community Association (GCA) and Retreat Village Association (RVA) Board meetings, the Board of Directors of both associations approved the Budget/ Finance Committee's recommended 2020 operating budgets. The approved budgets result in a \$1.00 per month increase in the GCA

assessment and a \$5.00 per month increase in the RVA assessment, if you are a member of the Retreat Village. The neighborhood assessments in the Retreat Village and the Pinnacle neighborhood were all approved with no increase in 2020. Both the GCA and the RVA Board of Directors approved the funding level for each association's capital reserve fund to the recommended funding level in the GCA and RVA updated reserve studies.

Did you know that the GCA assessment rate has increased by approximately 1.75% per year since 2002? The monthly assessment in 2002 was \$49.00 per month and the 2020 assessment rate is \$64.00 per month. This equates to an increase of less than \$1.00 per year over the past 18 years. This type of fiscal prudence with your assessments is not always the norm in community associations. Generally, the cost of goods and services increases annually, which results in the contract services expense, administrative costs, and maintenance/repair expenses increasing each year. Maintaining your monthly assessment at its current monthly rate is a result of the GCA and RVA Board of Directors finding ways to increase revenue while reducing expenditures.

Your monthly GCA assessment is used to pay for a wide range of services that affect all of you including the landscape maintenance throughout the community, the GCA office staff, 24-hour community patrol, maintenance of the community and neighborhood amenities such as ramadas and playground areas, and community events and activities.

The GCA's operating budget for 2020 includes the following increases:

• The patrol service expense is projected to increase by \$22,970 which reflects a \$1.00 per hour increase in the wage rate for the patrol officers with Trident Security Services that was previously approved by the GCA Board

of Directors due to the Arizona state mandated increase in the minimum wage rate in 2020.

- The landscape maintenance expense is projected to increase by \$26,148 which reflects a 3.4% increase in the landscape maintenance contract that was previously approved by the GCA Board of Directors due to the Arizona state mandated increase in the minimum wage rate in 2020.
- The salaries and benefits expense is projected to increase by \$25,955 to fund the Board-approved anticipated staff salary increases.
- There are several other increases in budget line items including a projected \$8,232 in the GCA office lease expense and an increase of \$10,000 in the water expense in 2020.

Several of the budget line items are anticipated to decrease or have no increase in the 2020 budget including a \$9,600 decrease in the newsletter expense and a \$2,400 decrease in the professional fees expense.

The Board of Directors of both the GCA and the RVA continue to adhere to their responsibility as fiduciaries of these non-profit corporations and expend the association's funds as prudently as possible. The Budget/Finance Committee and both the GCA and the RVA Board of Directors are to be commended for continuing to display fiscal responsibility with your assessment funds.

On another note, please join your Grayhawk neighbors by participating in some or all of the holiday programs scheduled in December. These include the Santa Party/Breakfast for Dinner Pajama Party on December 3, Holiday at the Hawk Dueling Pianos event on December 5, the Holiday Hayrides on December 11 and 12, and the Chanukah Celebration on December 18. Also, please remember to stop by the cocoa shack in Montevina.

Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting – November 4, 2019

Resident in attendance asked about Trident Security's responsibility when there are loud parties. Management stated that after 9 p.m. patrol typically does not approach the party due to safety concerns and residents should call the Scottsdale Police Department. Scottsdale Police ultimately enforces the noise ordinance.

A second resident in attendance inquired as to the status of the monument sign project. Staff updated the resident on the project and the multiple phases being worked through.

Development Committee

David Van Omen reported that a new cake shop would be opening in the Grayhawk Plaza near the veterinary office.

Operational Review Committee

Richard Zielinski reported that the committee did not meet.

Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that the committee did not meet but committee members and DLC Resources staff would be doing a drive on November 15 to look at the current status of the monument signs. The Landscape Committee will be meeting on November 19 to look at fire mitigation in the Deer Valley wash, butterfly garden signage, erosion repair and a few other upcoming projects.

DLC Resources continued to work on routing maintenance this month. They also focused on water usage, and decreased water to turf areas with the completion of the overseeding project.

The on-site crew is continuing to remove tree been pods and plant debris throughout the community. They are also removing tree blooms and raising low handing branches along sidewalks.

Community Enhancement Committee

Stacey Harvey reported that the Community Enhancement Committee did meet to review a request from the Communications Committee to fund up to \$10,000 for the Civic Rec module for the GCA website. Civic Rec is a stand alone add-on to the website that manages registration, volunteers and ticketing. This add-on will maintain the look of our current website, but will correct many issues staff is currently having with the registration process.

The Community Enhancement Committee made a recommendation and a motion was made and approved to pay up to \$10,000 from the Community Enhancement Fund for the Civic Rec module.

Event Planning Committee

Sarah Van Duyne reported that October events had been very successful. Paws in the Park, sponsored and planned by Sally Cashman with Russ Lyon Sotheby's, was very popular. Many

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residents brought their dogs out to enjoy the festivities and a good number of rescue dogs were adopted at the event.

Pumpkin Patch is always a favorite event and this year was no different. Over 350 attended for pumpkin decorating, crafts, games, food and fun.

Sunday in the Park was a big hit again this year. Everyone loved the food and staff has already received positive feedback from restaurants. The zip line was a big hit this year, as was the band.

Upcoming events include Mistletoe Market on November 16, the Santa Party on December 3, Holiday at the Hawk on December 5, Holiday Hayrides on December 11 and 12, and the Chanukah Party on December 18.

Communications Committee

Jennifer Sheets reported that the committee continued discussions regarding the Architectural Review Committee partnership. Stacey Harvey attended a portion of the last meeting to give an overview of the process to the Communications Committee and answered questions.

The committee reviewed the current forms required for the Architectural Review process and made multiple suggestions for improvement. Staff will start working on those documents and a mock-up website for the next meeting.

Architectural Review Committee

Paul Alessio reported there were a total of 8 submittals in October.

Stacey Harvey gave an update on the monument sign project, including the next phases and what that entails.

Budget/Finance Committee

Jeanette Griswold reported that the Board of Directors had previously approved increasing the GCA assessment rate by \$1 per month to \$64 per month. The GCA Board of Directors also approved funding a portion of the GCA reserve contribution.

A motion was made and approved to accept the 2020 GCA operating budget and the 2020 Pinnacle neighborhood budget.

Executive Committee

Michael Fee reported that the committee did not meet.

Treasurer's Report

Jeanette Griswold reported that year-to-date income is over budget, but that year-to-date expenses are over budget as well. Major contributors of the overage on the expenses side are water usage and collections.

Over \$559,000 has been deposited to the Community Enhancement Fund this year.

Management Report

Michael Fee reported that the common wall painting project is complete for 2019. Holiday lights are usually turned on Thanksgiving weekend but may be turned on a little earlier this year due to the Thanksgiving holiday being so late.

Enjoy a Safe Holiday Season, and Beyond

As the holidays approach, Trident Security would like to offer some helpful hints to keep our community as safe and secure as possible during this festive season. Whether you may be leaving the community to spend time with family and friends or hosting your own "winter" wonderland, there are some key proactive security measures we would like to suggest in order to prevent a Grinch from ruining your holiday season.

Harden the Target

Make your home more difficult to enter. Remember, the criminal will simply bypass your home if it requires too much effort, skill and time than they possess. Most burglars enter via the front, back or garage doors. Believe it or not, a common mistake a homeowner usually makes is leaving the garage door open and unattended. Not only does this dramatically weaken your home's barrier, it also creates a contained space for a burglar to work on your vehicle and any personal belongings found in your garage.

Burglars know to look inside your car for keys and other valuables so keep it locked, even when parked inside your garage. Please don't keep an extra key outside "under a rock"; even noncriminals know to look there.



Secure sliding glass doors

These points of entry are secured by latches not locks. They are vulnerable to being forced open from the outside because of these inherently defective latch mechanisms. This can easily be prevented by inserting a wooden dowel or stick into the track thus preventing or limiting movement. Other blocking devices available are metal fold-down blocking devices called "charley bars", as well as various track-blockers that can be screwed down into the door's track.

Be mindful

Windows are left unlocked and open at a much higher rate than doors. Ground floor windows are more susceptible to breakins for obvious reasons. Upper floor windows become attractive if they can be accessed from a stairway, tree, fence, or by climbing on balconies. Windows also have latches, not locks, and therefore should have secondary blocking devices to prevent sliding them open from the outside. In sleeping rooms, these window blocking devices should be capable of being removed easily from the inside to comply with fire codes. As a deterrent, place highly visible decals on the glass door near the latch mechanism that indicates that an alarm system, a dog or block watch/operation identification system is in place.

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TRIDENT SECURITY

Keep the lights on

Interior lighting is necessary to show signs of life and activity inside a residence at night. Night after night, a quiet and dark home sends the message to burglars that you are away on a trip. Inexpensive light timers can be utilized to randomly portray activities inside a vacant house. The same light timers can be used to turn on radios or television sets to further enhance the illusion of occupancy.

The most effective prevention attempt for crimes to your home may be the most intangible method of all—being a good neighbor. Get to know your neighbors on each side of your home and all around you, for that matter. Invite them into your home and communicate intent to watch their home while they're away. Ultimately, attempt to establish a sincere trust. Truly good neighbors will watch out for your home as if it were their own. They can report suspicious activity to both you and the police while you are away. Good neighbors can pick up your mail and newspapers, feed pets, and inspect the outside or inside of your home periodically to see that all is well. They can even occasionally park in your driveway to give the appearance of occupancy while you are on vacation. Ideally, it should be a goal for all of us to create a positive relationship with our neighbors so that in the big picture this request will only be a small favor to ask.

We hope these tips can assist you in your many preparations for the upcoming holidays. We look forward to being in partnership with the Grayhawk community and keeping your assets safe.

Purchase a Commemorative Brick



Our Desert, Our Home



Swoon for Spoons

I was recently helping a friend decide how to renovate her HUGE backyard when it happened. Out near Fountain Hills, this backyard is

larger than all of the total back yards on some

Grayhawk streets. The not-small swimming pool takes up less than 1/4 of the total footprint and is off to the side. The rest was in lawn; flat brown lawn.

This open-to-the-sky back yard needed trees; lots of them. A small Mesquite bosque (mini-forest) came to mind.

It also needed berming, large boulders and an understory. So, the big things, trees, rocks and shaping were obvious. Once revealed to them, my friends got it immediately. Theirs was a big blank space that has the potential to be drop-dead gorgeous.

Trees, rocks and shaping create a framework. They do not make a landscape. My friends needed an understory and the plants needed to be big enough to hold their own in a landscape as large and rugged as the one they envisioned.

How do you fill a space that seems the size of a football field? I solved this problem by going for a walk.

What Works?

It's where I do some of my best problem-solving. No earbuds or other distractions. Just me and the sounds of nature on my daily walk and my imagination runs free. That day, I paid particular attention to Mesquites and their under-stories. And, I noticed for the first time how many Desert Spoons were planted under or near Mesquite trees.

That's when it happened. It was the beginning of my swoon.

Mesquites and Spoons are a natural and lovely combination. Both are Sonoran natives and they compliment one another beautifully.

It is truly remarkable how often that happens. Plant a couple of natives near one another and 10 times out of



10, you'll create an effect that seems, well, natural.

Another reason this combination works is one of scale. Mesquites can easily get to $30^{\circ} \times 30^{\circ}$ and Desert Spoons can reach 4-5' high and wide.

If you were to plant two or three Desert Spoons beneath a Mesquite tree, you would have no need for other plants. Both are low water use and both are fit to endure our harsh climate with little additional attention from us. Even better? These Spoons easily tolerate a bit of shade.

And, They Bloom

As a bonus to their being carefree and durable, Desert Spoons bloom every year, sending up a single flower stalk, much like an Agave or a Yucca. The skyward spire pictured here is flanked by an Ocotillo and an Ironwood Tree. Its rust-colored flowers make it a standout against the blue sky.

As with all desert plants, Desert Spoons have adapted to make maximum use of whatever water comes their way. They take their common name from the fact that their leaves, right at the base of the plant are spoon-shaped to pull as much rainwater into their base as possible. Spoons have long, narrow leaves with teeth lining the margins which sets them apart from another species in their genus.

Toothless Spoons

The *Dasylirion quadrangulatum* is a sister plant to the Desert Spoon and is also a good accent plant, but not under trees.

This plant needs full sun, little water and room to grow because at full size it will get 6'-9' x 6'-9'! Holy cow. That's a big plant.

But, it is so delicate looking, it doesn't appear to take up as much space as its size implies.

Here is a photo of mine. This one was planted about 5 years ago and has done great but it will need to be moved soon, to a spot where it can grow to its full potential.

Warm Up with Lentil Soup

Have you ever had homemade lentil soup? If so, you probably have a relative from Germany, Italy or the Mideast who carried on the tradition of making this hearty and healthy soup. In Germany, lentil soup is traditionally served on New Year's Eve to promote good luck. There is a saying that

goes: "Serving lentil soup on New Year's Eve will ensure you don't run out of pennies in the coming year." This lentil soup recipe is a European spin on traditional American bean soup and is just as easy to make.

Lentils are a member of the legume family and they are protein-packed. One cup of cooked lentils has 6-18 grams of protein and is also an excellent source of soluble fiber. Lentils cook up quickly, faster than beans which make them a great choice for a speedy meal. This is also a frugal one-pot meal loaded with protein, whether you add meat or not. I did not add meat to this pot of soup but I added lots of extra veggies.

You can find lentil soups in cans at the grocery store. Progressive, Amy's Organic, and even Campbell's has a lentil soup, but I've always found that with



store-bought soups, every spoonful tastes exactly the same. Homemade soups are more flavorful and each spoonful tastes a little different. Whenever I make soup I make a large quantity and usually freeze half. So if you follow this recipe you will have plenty to share or freeze for later. Before eating, be sure to add a splash of apple cider vinegar to your bowl. It will heighten all of the blended flavors and vinegar also aids in digestion. Happy Soup Season to you!

Lentil Soup Prep time: 20 minutes • Cook time: 60 minutes • 8 to 10 servings

Ingredients:

- 1 ½ bags lentils (1 ½ lbs), thoroughly rinsed
- optional: 1 lb sausage, ham, or bacon
- 2 32 ounce containers + 1 cup organic beef broth
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 onion (Vidalia or Spanish), chopped
- 3 ribs celery with leaves, chopped
- 2 leaks, thoroughly rinsed and sliced
- 8-10 carrots, peeled and sliced
- 2 large Idaho potatoes, peeled and chopped bite-sized
- 1 ½ cups baby spinach leaves, washed and chopped
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons pepper
- 2 teaspoons beef bouillon (we like Better Than Bouillon)
- apple cider vinegar

Instructions:

- 1. Rinse lentils with water and drain. Repeat a few times.
- 2. Chop and slice all vegetables. If adding meat to the recipe, cut bite-sized.
- Heat oil in bottom of large soup pot and sauté onion a minute or two until translucent. Add beef broth, lentils and vegetables to pot and bring to a boil.
- 4. Reduce heat and simmer, stir in salt, pepper and bouillon.
- 5. Simmer soup on medium low heat with a lid for about 45 minutes until vegetables are tender.
- 6. Add a splash of apple cider vinegar before serving.

This is a great counter service spot and a perfect stop on a busy day of holiday shopping or entertaining visiting family and fiends. It also helps to balance out all of the cookies and holiday party appetizers you'll be eating! Their menu has everything from salads to protein bowls, sandwiches to breakfast. The menu also features kid-friendly choices and options for those that are gluten, dairy, lactose and soy free, as well as both vegetarian and vegan options.

I was sure Jenn was going straight for a salad, but she surprised me this month! She ordered the Spicy Korean Steak bowl with roasted broccoli, cauliflower, carrot, mushroom, green onion, sesame seed, and bok choy. With the protein bowls you have a choice of brown rice or sweet potato hash, or for a \$1 you can substitute forbidden rice or quinoa. Jenn chose the sweet potato hash. She loves spice and it's a good thing. She said the sauce was delicious and had a nice kick to it.



I ordered the club sandwich. It was served on 12 grain with turkey, provolone, tomato, onion, house greens, avocado pesto and red wine vinaigrette. The bread for all of their sandwiches is locally sourced and delivered daily. For a small upcharge you can substitute a whole wheat or gluten free wrap. The presentation of both of our lunches was inviting and we both cleaned our plates like good little girls. There was nothing to take home to nibble on.

They serve a variety of drinks including tea, craft sodas, coffee, juices and smoothies. I am looking forward to heading back to try their breakfast. The avocado toast looked amazing!

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
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
