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

Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting – January 6, 2020

A resident in attendance asked about the RVA landscape maintenance schedule. Michael Fee gave the resident information on Natural Area Open Space (NAOS) and shared that per City of Scottsdale guidelines we are limited on how we can landscape those areas.

Development Committee

David Van Omen reported that there has been quite a bit of progress in the Cavasson development.

Operational Review Committee

Stacey Harvey reported that the committee had met and discussed the hourly pay rate for Trident Security Services staff. The committee reviewed a proposal and discussed the five year renewal of the contract. Due to minimum wage increases, Trident is proposing a contract with built-in yearly increases to manage budgets while providing a competitive salary/benefits package.

A motion was made and approved to accept the proposed security contract with an annual increase of \$1 per hour over the next five years.

Keith Zollman from Studio KZ discussed the Design-Build Agreement for Construction for the renovation of the Raptor and Talon guardhouses. He gave extensive detail about the proposed plans and answered questions from the Board of Directors.

Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that the committee did not meet. Crews have been working to clean up after a wave of winter storms, including repair of 75' of view fencing damaged by a Palo Verde tree falling over from common area.

Seasonal pruning is in a four week cycle, and crews are trimming to promote new growth and maintain site lines.

Community Enhancement Committee

Stacey Harvey reported that the Community Enhancement Committee did not meet.



Event Planning Committee

Sarah Van Duyne reported that holiday events had been very successful. The upcoming Ice Den Happy Hour is already full with a wait list. Other upcoming events include the Concert in the Park, featuring the band Switchback from Chicago.

Communications Committee

Jennifer Sheets reported that the committee continued discussions regarding the Architectural Review Committee partnership. The committee worked to update the current application process/forms and will be continuing to discuss this project and the Annual Meeting at the next Communications Committee meeting.

Paul Alessio reported there were a total of 12 submittals in December. Most all were approved.

Budget/Finance Committee

Jeanette Griswold reported that the committee will be meeting soon.

New Business

A motion was made and approved to accept the proposal submitted by Mansperger Patterson and McMullin to perform the 2019 audit of the GCA financial statements and prepare the GCA 2019 tax return at a cost of \$6,500.00.

Treasurer's Report

Jeanette Griswold reported that year-to-date income is over budget. Major contributors of the overage are collections and special events.

Year to date, \$688,094.00 has been deposited to the Community Enhancement Fund.

Management Report

Michael Fee reported that the painting project on the north section of The Park is nearly complete. New stone and stone caps have been installed on the monument signs in the Raptor Retreat and new stone has been installed on the condominium monument signs.

Streetlamp performing classic hits with tight harmonies. All of this right in your backyard—North Scottsdale.



City of Scottsdale 2020 Brush Pickup Schedule

Brush pickup is designed to provide an easy and convenient way for residents to dispose of items generated from their homes which are too large in size or too large in quantity to dispose of in their refuse container. Please stack items neatly, parallel to the street on your front property line, where your trash collection typically takes place.

Please follow these simple guidelines relating to Brush Pickup:

- Piles should not exceed 10' long by 6' wide by 4' tall.
- Solid waste crews will only spend 20 minutes per residence so if you
 exceed these limits, materials left behind will be picked up on the
 following month's brush pickup collection date and must be removed
 from the curb until the next collection.
- Crews are responsible for large debris only, and small debris left behind is the responsibility of the resident to clean up.
- Do not place construction waste, loose grass, remodeling materials, rocks, loose leaves or twigs, dirt, loose refuse or uncovered/unboxed cactus out for collection. City crews cannot collect these items.
- Do not mix trash, rocks, dirt, wire, cactus, grass, bricks, cement, or other materials in with your brush. Crews will be unable to collect your brush until these items are removed.
- Please separate your brush and bulk pickup into two piles
 one for green waste and one for everything else. The piles will

be picked up by separate trucks during your designated brush and bulk pickup week. The green waste – yard clippings, branches and trimmings – will be composted to help grow new plants, while the rest will be taken to the landfill for disposal.

- Tree limbs and other objects must be less than 12 inches in diameter.
- Keep glass separate from other items in sturdy boxes measuring no more than 2'x2'x2'. Please clearly mark these items.
- Do not put out paint, paint thinners, strippers, pesticides, batteries, motor oils, chlorine, pool acid, or other prohibited items. Each homeowner is responsible for proper disposal of these items. Any size tires will not be collected.
- Do not park within 10 feet of bulk piles.

Remember that each homeowner is responsible for the manner in which their material is placed out for collection, whether or not they hire someone else to do the work.

Your items will be collected sometime during the week collection is scheduled, beginning on the Monday shown in the schedule below. Please have your items placed by 5:00 a.m. the Monday of the week scheduled for pickup, however, do not have your items out more than five days prior to that. Thank you for your cooperation.



Also, remember that regular trash containers are picked up on Mondays and recycling containers are picked up on Thursdays. Please have your cans out no earlier than dusk the day prior to pickup and no later than dusk the day of pickup. 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

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

A New Point of View

Let's conduct a little thought experiment, shall we? I want you to think like a plant. Yep. Take a deep breath and let's go for it!

Imagine if you were immobile, outdoors, in the desert, for decades and maybe millennia on end. For starters, you'd be bored out of your mind. But what if you didn't have a mind? You're not a sentient being but you are a productive and helpful member of your community.

Your most important challenge is sustaining life. You need food, water, air and sunshine. You have no grocery store, no system

of canals shepherding water to you from the Colorado River. You're okay for air, but sunshine is often your enemy and rain is infrequent.

To sustain life, you need food but that immobility thing gets in the way.

A Community of Food Producers

No matter where you lay down your roots, you must produce your own food. Food production is as natural to you as transpiration. Remember? Humans perspire; plants transpire.

Put on your "human hat" again, just for a sec.

Every time, everywhere you see green (it doesn't matter the shade or the hue) you're seeing food production. All plants take water, air and sunlight and make food. You'll recall from high school biology that this process is called photosynthesis.

What if you had to make your own food? Not grow it. Make it. With nothing more than water, air and sunshine. Would your perspective shift? At least a little?

... back to being a plant.

If you're a plant, making your own food is essential for survival.

That, and attracting really enthusiastic pollinators. But, I digress.

When it comes to photosynthesis, trees are the rock stars of the plant world because not only do they make their own food, but they also take air, sunshine and water and turn them into wood. Pretty neat trick. Each tree is like an independent non-stop-no-down-time wood manufacturer.

Plants and trees have no choice in where they spend their lives and once in place are unlikely to move - at least not under their own power. It would be easy to think of them as simply existing along side us, if we think of them at all.

Let's Pay Attention

We humans don't notice plants much. Sure, we sometimes pay attention to how quickly a plant has grown or if it appears to be ailing or if it was damaged by a storm. But, other than those obvious things, we generally take for granted the parallel universe growing all around us.

And, it's not as if plants make it easy for us to notice, either. They don't mark time the way humans do. If humans are sprinters, the plant world is in an ultramarathon.

The Long Haul

Saguaros don't sprout their first arms until they're in their 70s or so and, by then, they're just getting started. They haven't even reached middle age at this point.

Native Palo Verdes (aka Foothills Palo Verde, aka Parkinsonia microphylla) have a life span of about 400 years. Without them, this desert, as we know it, does not exist. Food (ahem) for thought, huh?

- 1 cup butter

Add & mix by hand vigorously:

- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 eggs, slightly beaten
- 2 cups sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt

Add & mix by hand vigorously:

• ½ cup flour

Grease 9 x 9 inch square or 8 x 12 inch rectangular pan

Bake at 340 degrees for approximately 20 minutes.

Brownies are done when a toothpick comes up clean.

Carol Peters Incredible Icing:

Ingredients:

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
- Pinch of salt

Directions:

In a saucepan, combine sugar, cocoa powder, butter and milk. Stir to dissolve sugar and bring to a boil. Cook 1 minute. Add vanilla and pinch of salt. With hand mixer or by hand, beat until cool and thickened enough to spread over brownies.

We ordered Rustica (beef with parmesan cheese sauce), Chicken with pesto sauce, Eggplant (stuffed with mozzarella and covered in marinara), Spicy Sausage with barbeque sauce, short rib with gravy sauce, and Cauliflower with tomato curry sauce. The Cauliflower was vegan, vegetarian and gluten free.

We thoroughly enjoyed our six choices, except neither of us loved the cauliflower meatball. I have seen in reviews that many people claimed that is their favorite. However, neither of us are big curry fans. Jennifer loved the spicy sausage, but I didn't care for it because it was too spicy for me. I thought the short rib was very good.

I wanted a little bread, so we also ordered the *Cheesy Garlic Focaccia* with herb crema. It was delicious, but there was so much bread! It's definitely something to order for a crowd. Jennifer took leftovers back to the office for the rest of staff to sample.





All in all we thoroughly enjoyed our meals. I think that ordering meatball flights was definitely the way to go, as we got to sample a few different options. The service was great and the Staff was very attentive.
