# Manager's Corner



This month I would like to address community safety throughout Grayhawk and how you can help the on-site management team to continue to provide a safe environment. However, I would first like to commend Grayhawk's community patrol and guardhouse staff for the outstanding job they do and for the great service they provide to all of you as homeowners. Grayhawk is a very large community and, due to its size, the community patrol staff deals with a wide range of safety concerns some of these they are able to resolve while others require involvement from outside entities, such as the Scottsdale Police Department, APS, or the City of Scottsdale.

Grayhawk's community patrol staff provides a wide range of services throughout the community and for the residents, including snake removal, jumping dead car batteries, helping to find lost pets, and assisting with community events.

When dealing with safety/security issues, the primary responsibility for the community patrol officer is to observe and report what has occurred, and, if possible, attempt to resolve the problem or situation. This is often not possible because, as I am sure you are aware, Grayhawk's community patrol staff does not perform police duties or functions, and they have been instructed to never put themselves in harm's way.

However, Grayhawk's security personnel have been effective in addressing many, mostly minor, types of issues that occur within our community. If you observe any suspicious activity in your neighborhood or in a common area located in Grayhawk, please report this to the Grayhawk Community Association (GCA) office at 480-563-9708 during business hours (Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.) or the on-site security staff by calling either the Raptor guardhouse at 480-502-5078 or the Talon guardhouse at 480-502-7685, and a community patrol officer will be dispatched to the area. You are also encouraged to report any mischievous or inappropriate behavior by children within the community such as skateboarding or bicycle riding on the tennis courts; driving a motorized vehicle on the community trail system or in the greenbelts; or graffiti/ defacing neighborhood monument signs, ramadas, picnic tables, community walls, or mailbox structures. I mention these examples because they have all occurred in the past and with your help, hopefully we can prevent them from happening in the future.

Our community patrol does a good job of detecting this type of activity when driving through the community, but they cannot be everywhere at once and we appreciate your help in our attempts to reduce incidents of this nature. Finally, please notify the GCA office or the security staff as soon as you can after observing the type of activity described above and try to be as detailed as possible regarding the location and type of incident. With your help, together we can make Grayhawk an even better and safer community.

Stay cool this summer and we'll talk again soon.

# Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting – June 4, 2018

### **Development Committee**

Paul Alessio spoke about the Crossroads East development, slated for south of Grayhawk. There is a public meeting scheduled in the Champions Room at the Grayhawk Golf Club on June 5. This property is currently part of the Arizona State Trust lands that are managed by the Arizona State Land Department. At the City of Scottsdale Planning Commission hearing on May 9, the Planning Commission voted to recommend Scottsdale City Council approval of a proposed rezoning amendment for this property. The Scottsdale City Council will vote on this rezoning amendment at the June 12 City Council meeting.

### **Operational Review Committee**

Richard Zielinski reported that the committee did not meet.

### Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that the committee did not meet. John Eubank has replaced Jim Carter as DLC Resources on-site superintendent for the landscape maintenance crew.

DLC Resources continues to work on the routine cycle maintenance of the community landscaping. During the past month, DLC has continued to focus on monitoring the water usage throughout the community. Water usage was up 30% due to lack of rain.

The first round of pruning for above contract heights was completed. Community backflow testing is underway.

### **Community Enhancement Committee**

Bob Mann reported that the committee did not meet.

### **Event Planning Committee**

Margo Bellock reported that Sarah Van Duyne, along with a couple Event Planning committee members, will be conducting site visits at their four final organizations selected for an annual charitable partnership. These include AZ Cancer Center, Hands on Greater Phoenix, AZ Helping Hands and The Singletons.

Sarah Van Duyne reported that the Just for Her Royal Tea Party had been a huge success. Good Morning Arizona was filming during the morning of the event and the English Rose Tea Room offered to provide the entire tea at no cost to Grayhawk attendees.

Upcoming events include a free movie night at Harkins 101 featuring Incredibles 2 on June 21.

### **Communications Committee**

Jennifer Sheets reported that the new website is still in process. The content transfer from our current site has taken place and staff training will begin on June 25.



### Architectural Review Committee

Paul Alessio reported that there were meetings on May 1 and 15, with a total of 14 submittals.

The monument sign project is moving slowly but still underway. The committee will be reviewing this project at the June 5 meeting and a completed mockup should be ready by the next Board of Directors meeting.

### **Budget/Finance Committee**

Jeanette Griswold reported that the committee did not meet but will be meeting over the summer to review the audit.

### **Executive Committee**

Linda Shaw reported that there was no meeting.

### New Business

The Board of Directors reviewed a proposed 5-year management contract with CCMC. The proposed contract has a 90 day termination clause by either party.

A motion was made and approved to accept the 5-year management contract with CCMC.

Management is recommending that the Board of Directors engages an independent third party contractor to do an initial safety audit of the playground equipment and play areas, and also enter into a safety program where the playground equipment is

maintained and inspected bi-annually. Not only is this responsible practice, but it can lessen the association's liability in the case of an accident.

Management presented three bids and recommended the GCA engage the Playground Police to conduct an initial audit and follow-up inspection of all eight playground areas in 2018 at a cost of \$3,040, and engage the Playground Police to conduct bi-annual inspections going forward at a cost of \$1,280 per year.

A motion was made and approved to accept the Playground Police contract, paying \$3,040 from the miscellaneous expense line item of the 2018 operating budget, with subsequent years paid from the operating budget.

### Treasurer's Report

Jeanette Griswold reported that through April revenue is exceeding expenses. \$59,602 was taken in to the Community Enhancement Fund in April, with a year-to-date total of \$243,839.

### Management Report

Michael Fee reported that the DLC culvert inspection has been completed and there is no heavy silt build up or desert debris in any of the culverts, so they will not have to be cleaned out this year.

The new maintenance assistant, Chantel Broomfield, began working onsite on May 14.

# Succulents are Right at Home in Our Desert Environment

What makes for a great landscape? If you look at the common areas at Grayhawk, you'll notice that there are several plant species of differing size, shape and color varied throughout the landscape. This creates a dynamic look, with a lot of color and variety as your eye moves throughout the area.

You can implement the same principle in your own backyards and outdoor spaces. One good way to add a bit of color and interest is with succulents. While the official designation of which plants are actually succulents differs, they're generally defined as plants with thick leaves and stems that are used to store water.

Succulents come in many shapes, colors and textures, and most of them look very different from the annuals and perennial plants you probably already have in your backyard. In addition, they're particularly well-suited for the Sonoran Desert, with most of them doing well in warm temperatures with lots of sun and in dry, well-draining soil.

As an added benefit, succulents are particularly easy to propagate yourself. With a few steps, you can grow an entire garden's worth of succulents from just a few plants.

However, there are still important considerations to consider when adding them to your landscape — whether you choose to put them in containers on a patio or directly into the ground. Here are three succulent species that will do well at Grayhawk, and tips for caring for each of them.


# **Totem Pole Cactus** (Pachycereus schottii f. monstrosus)

Native to Mexico, the Totem Pole Cactus can be grown in containers or planted in the native desert soil. It has a rather unique look, with a thornless, smooth surface and light pink flowers bloom in spring (but only open at night). Totem Poles make great tall accents for any garden, reaching a height of 10-12 feet tall. They'll grow about equally wide, so keep that in mind as you choose its planting location.

• Care: Likes full sun and can tolerate reflected heat from streets, walks and buildings. Water deeply when surrounding soil is completely dry as it can be susceptible to root rot. Needs protection from hard frosts.



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• **Propagation:** Make a clean, slightly slanted cut from the top of a branch. Making the cut at an angle reduces the chance of water collecting on the top and causing rot. Plant the cut end into well-draining soil without watering for several weeks to allow cut end to harden and protect from rot.

### Elephant Food (Portulacaria afra)


Elephant Food is native to South Africa, and — as its name suggests — it is commonly eaten by elephants in its native habitat. Like the Totem Pole Cactus, Elephant Food can be grown in containers or planted directly into the ground. If protected from frost, a single plant can span up to 12 feet across. However, it is susceptible to white flies, mealy bugs and spider mites, so be watchful for these pests.

- Care: Plant in well-draining soil. Keep out of direct afternoon sun as leaves can suffer sunburn. Irrigate regularly in warmer months, do not allow plant roots to sit in water. Protect from frost.
- **Propagation:** The best time to propagate this plant is when daytime temperatures are between 65° 100° F. Elephant Food plants leak sap, so wear gloves to protect your hands. Use a sharp knife to cut a stem about 6-8" long, making a clean right cut at the branching point. Soak or spray the cut end with water until sap stops leaking. Harden the stem by letting it sit outside for a few days; then put the calloused end of the stem in soil at a depth of about 3-4". Water until well established, but let soil dry out completely before watering again.

### **Aloe Varieties**

Aloe is probably the succulent most people are familiar with. But there are more varieties in the family than just Aloe Vera. In fact, there are several species — from the Blue Elf (which produces red blooms) to the Soap Aloe to the Aloe Ferox (which grows on a stem and can reach up to 10 feet in height). Aloe plants are all drought tolerant once established; however they do need protection from frost. They produce "pups," smaller plants that can be completely removed from the mother plant and grown as separate plants.

- Care: Plant in well-draining soil. Keep out of direct afternoon sun, as leaves can suffer sunburn. Once established, irrigate as needed in warmer months and infrequently in the winter months. Do not allow plant roots to sit in water.
- **Propagation:** Use a sharp tool to remove the pup(s) from the parent plant. Make sure you trim so that there are roots on the pup(s). Allow to dry out for a day or two before replanting in either house plant pot or as a patio or yard plant.

### RIDESHARE WITH EASE

More and more, residents are relying on rideshare companies like Uber and Lyft to get them where they need to be. For some, especially those living in a condominium/townhome or gated community, rideshares come with a few obstacles.

There are a few steps that you can take to ensure a smooth transaction. To start, if you live in the Retreat Village, make sure that you have the rideshare company on your guest list. To add them, simply login on to www.gateaccess.net or the ABDI app. If you aren't sure of your username and password, you can call the GCA office at 480-563-9708. You can add the company as a temporary guest, or if you use a rideshare regularly and are prone to forgetting, add them permanently.

Most rideshare companies will only get your first name when you reserve a ride, and most often are not automatically given your unit number if you live in a condo or townhome. This causes quite a few problems as they come through the manned gates, as the staff will ask for your full address and verify your name before granting the driver access. In addition, if you live in a community with an unmanned gate, the driver will not have a gate code or last name to look you up and call you.



The best way to get around this is to contact your driver directly. For example with Uber, after you order your ride, you will see a bar at the bottom of your app screen. You can click that bar and text your unit number (the Uber driver will see a dummy cell phone number and not your actual number), specifying that the driver will need to give the address and unit number to the gate attendant. Then, the gate attendant can verify your first name and grant access without any glitches. From the Uber website:

delicious recipe for everything. My friend Gretchen is that person. She has worked in the food industry for many years, most recently at a very successful small-town bakery where she happily bakes pies, cakes and cookies at 5 a.m. while the rest of the town sleeps. She is always working on a new recipe twist like white chocolate raspberry scones or black forest brownies, and of course her girlfriends are the lucky recipients of these trial recipes.

She also makes the best guacamole. Whenever she hosts a party or a girls' getaway, which she often does, we all just expect that bowl of delicious guacamole to be waiting for us. Since the club where we play tennis together doesn't serve guacamole in their restaurant, Gretchen often sneaks some in for our quesadillas! This past Cinco de Mayo she was inundated with requests from her friends (including me) for her guacamole recipe. So now, with her permission, I am happy to share it with you.

There are a multitude of ways to make guacamole, but this is my new favorite. ### Gretchie's Guac

Prep time: 15 minutes

Enough for 2-3 people (double or triple for larger groups)

### **Ingredients:**

- 2 large or 3 small ripe avocados (darker in skin color, and yields to gentle pressure)
- 2 green onions (cut off the white tip, and finely chop)
- 2 tablespoons red onion (minced)
- 1 Roma tomato (seeds and pulp removed and chopped)

- 1 jalapeno (unseeded, and minced)
- juice of ½ fresh lime
- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon Lawrys seasoned salt (or to taste)
- few sprigs of cilantro, finely chopped

- 1. Cut avocado and remove flesh
- 2. Remove seed (can be saved as a preservative to store with any leftover guacamole)
- 3. Mash avocados but don't overdo it...chunky is okay, set aside
- 4. Chop all of the ingredients above, and add to the mashed avocado and seasonings

# Denizens of the Desert: Agaves

This month, we launch a six part series on familiar plants. We know them when we see them but, at the same time, they're like strangers among us. A better understanding of these

plants gives us insight into their role in our ecosystem and helps us better appreciate their contribution to our austere and harshly beautiful desert environment. First up: Agaves.

### What is it about Agaves?

Long before I went to Desert Landscape School I learned that the last thing an Agave does before it dies is bloom - for the first time. I didn't believe it at first but once I confirmed the truth in this, I became fascinated by these plants.

Agaves' grab our attention with their strong architectural shapes and perfect rosette leaf patterns but this is just the beginning. Beyond the obvious is a species that has captivated horticulturalists and botanists since at least the 18th century and indigenous people for thousands of years prior to that.

There are hundreds of species of Agave. They are native to environments with sandy, well drained soil. You'll find them in landscapes on the Florida gulf coast as well as in the deserts of the southwest, down into Mexico and extending to Central America.

To be sure, these are not tropical plants but they can and do grow well in warm sandy-soiled environments as long as there isn't too much rain. Even in sandy soil, more than 20 inches of rain a year can be problematic for them.

Though we think of them as desert plants, they often struggle in full sun when temperatures are routinely above 105 degrees. Almost all of these plants benefit from some shade. The happiest among them are planted under trees. Their modest but sturdy root systems make them good below-the-surface companions of protective desert trees.

### **Taking a Closer Look**

One of the most consistently striking features of Agaves is their bud prints. Agave leaves emerge from the center of the plant and are tightly contained until they unfurl themselves. The leaves are so tightly wrapped that their edges make a permanent impression on the leaf surface. When the leaves unfold, they appear to be embossed. This can be striking or subtle but it is a

common among these plants. Once you know it's there and begin to look for it, the surprise is how different imprinting is from one agave to the next.

Agaves range is size from just 4 inches to an astonishing 12 feet across. They are generally a bit wider than they are tall. Their lifespans are anywhere from 7 to about 70 years; the notion of a "century plant" is a myth.



### **About Those Flower Stalks**

Why do these plants bloom and then die? Agaves have a single site in the center of the plant that produces leaves and the flower stalk. They can produce only one or the other. When an agave sends up a flower stalk, it consumes its center so cell division and growth are no longer possible.

In yet another quirky feature of these plants, not all agave flower stalks are the same. Some have candelabra-shaped stalks. Others have spike-shaped stalks. Still others are somewhere in between.

These often majestic and fast-growing stalks are but one way agaves ensure the survival of their species. The other way is through producing off-sets, commonly known as pups. Not all agaves produce pups - the Queen Victoria doesn't which might account for how expensive these are. That, and they are slow growers.

As you can see, one of the

downsides of agaves is that if you plant several of the same size at the same time, you run the risk of them flowering at the same time, too.

Some agaves produce so many pups it gets downright annoying. Others will pup slowly and infrequently.

Still others send their pups a good distance from the mother plant and end up creating their own mini-landscapes in the process. Black Tooth Agaves and Artichoke Agaves excel at this. Allow a lot of space for these two - 3 to 4 feet at least - or be prepared to transplant them in a few years. All pups are perfect clones of the parent plant.

### Which Agaves are Best for Landscapes?

If you want a specimen plant, i.e. a stand-out onesie, you can't do much better than an **American Agave** (*Agave americana*). They have among the longest of agave lifespans, they don't pup much, they are a beautiful blue color and they have fascinating bud prints.


The downside of this species is that it is especially susceptible to the agave snout beetle aka the agave weevil. This insect establishes itself in the center of the plant, lays its eggs and the new weevil family will quickly lay waste to an otherwise healthy agave. The only way to prevent this is to treat your agaves once a year, in late February or early March, with a systemic insecticide.

With hundreds of Agave species, your choice will only be limited to what is available at your local nursery or a friend's yard. Agaves are easy to transplant and if you know someone who has some attractive agave pups, that would be another good place to start. Look for species that stay smaller than, say, 3' across. You can mass these for a spectacular effect.

### Want to Learn More?

The single best contemporary source on agaves is Greg Starr's **Agaves: Living sculptures for landscapes and containers.** This book is filled with gorgeous photos. It is a great resource, a handsome coffee table book and would be a great gift for someone who loves desert plants.

**Next month's denizen?** The infinitely varied Prickly Pear.



If your family is anything like mine, you realize at some point you are missing out on all sorts of cool stuff that Arizona has to offer. I'm not talking about a staycation at the Princess (although those are equally amazing), rather, the get outside and touch nature kind of venture.

If you're looking for that type of unique Arizona experience, consider taking a drive beyond the Painted Desert to northeast Arizona. There you will find Canyon de Chelly, a one-of-a-kind landscape and the cherished homeland of the Navajo people. While not as immediately spectacular as the Grand Canyon, Canyon de Chelly does have sheer sandstone walls rising up to 1,000 feet, several scenic overlooks and many well-preserved Anasazi ruins. Our family found it a more intimate experience than visiting the Grand Canyon, as there are far fewer visitors.

Canyon de Chelly is recognized as one of the longest continually inhabited landscapes in North America, featuring pueblo ruins built between 350 and 1300 A.D. What's especially unique is that visitors today can view ruins alongside current farm homes of the Navajo from overlooks along the rim.

Canyon de Chelly National Monument is administered as part of the National Park Service but since it lies on Navajo land, admission is free (donations are accepted at the Visitor Center). Visitors have a few options for enjoying the canyon, including unsupervised access through the South Rim Drive (seven overlooks)



and North Rim Drive (three overlooks). We chose to drive the South Rim., where the scenery is spectacular, including the White House Ruin cliff dwellings and the 800-foot sandstone spire known as Spider Rock. Many Navajo sell jewelry and other handmade gifts at the overlooks, and we enjoyed chatting with them and browsing their offerings.

A self-guided hike to the White House Ruins is also an option. The ruins, some of the



oldest in the canyon, date to approximately 1200. The trail is steep in some areas but well-maintained. We were told it would take approximately 2 hours to get down and back, depending on our fitness level. For all other trips down or along the canyon, a Navajo escort is required. Private tour companies registered with the Navajo Nation Parks and Recreation offer tours into the canyon by vehicle, horseback or hiking.

Chinle, the gateway to Canyon de Chelly National Monument, is the nearest option for gas, groceries, supplies, and a hotel. For our visit, we stayed in Show Low and made a day trip to Canyon de Chelly.

There is a camp store located at the visitor center, where you can pick up a free park map and activity schedule. The visitor center is open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., except on Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day.

If you're taking kids, consider having them participate in the Junior Ranger program. Our kids always love completing their packets and learning more about the cultural and natural resources associated with each park we visit. It also keeps them busy, which we like! Stop at the Visitor Center to pick up a free worksheet, pencil and trash bag. Complete the activities and return the worksheet to a Park Ranger to earn a badge, postcard, and booklet.


# Trash and Recycling Reminder

Please be aware that during the summer months, City of Scottsdale trash and recycling pickup may take place earlier in the day than it does during other times of the year. Please observe the City of Scottsdale guidelines outlined below:

- Place your container on the street with wheels against the curb by 5 a.m. on collection days and remove it the same day
- Keep your container at least four feet from parked cars, mailboxes and other obstacles that may prevent our crews from picking it up
- Don't overfill your container the lid must close per Maricopa County Health Department standards
- If your city-owned container needs repair, please call 480-312-5600 or email Scottsdale Solid Waste

### **GARBAGE AND TRASH SPECIFICS INCLUDE:**

- Bag & tie garbage & grass before placing it in your black trash container
- This helps control odors and pests and is required by law
- Don't place rocks, dirt, building materials, electronics or hazardous waste in your trash container
- Scottsdale Solid Waste collects brush and bulk material once per month
- Scottsdale Solid Waste offers Household Hazardous Waste collection services
- Scottsdale Solid Waste offers an Electronics Recycling drop-off event
- If you need an additional black trash container, you can purchase one and pay for additional service-please call 480-312-5600





### **RECYCLING SPECIFICS INCLUDE:**

- Only put accepted materials in your recycling container
- Don't place plastic bags or liners in your recycling container as they can damage the equipment used at the sorting facility
- Instead, many local grocery stores offer plastic shopping bag recycling drop-off containers
- Make sure your recyclable materials are clean, dry and empty
- Break down or cut-up cardboard boxes to keep them from getting stuck in your container


