Manager's Corner



This month I thought I would update you on the numerous projects and issues that the on-site staff for the Grayhawk Community Association (GCA) and Retreat Village Association (RVA) has been working on for the past couple months and will be working on in the upcoming months. While some of our events and activities might slow down a little during the summer months, our projects continue to keep us very busy.

The on-site crew for Grayhawk's landscape contractor DLC Resources has finished the seasonal pruning throughout

the community for this year. You may have noticed the DLC Resources tree crew throughout the community as they continue with the annual tree trimming project in which we crown thin 900-1,000 trees each year. DLC Resources will also be updating the landscape in front of monument signs within the Retreat Village. This is the final phase of our monument sign update project.

The street sealing project in the Talon Point, Renaissance, Avante and Monterey Retreat neighborhoods is scheduled to be done from June 15 - 18. Homeowners in these neighborhoods who will be affected by these street repairs will be notified of the schedule for this project in late May.

Work on the GCA and RVA 2020 audits is nearing completion by the GCA's auditing firm of Mansperger Patterson and McMullin.

Finally, the RVA's gate maintenance contractor, Park Pro, has installed new operators and cameras at several of the entry gates in the Retreat Village and we will be looking at some possible upgrades to the gate access system during the guardhouse remodel project.

Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting — May 3, 2021

Development Committee

David Van Omen reported that a homeowner had recently questioned whether or not the Scottsdale airport flight patterns had changed. He shared the flight patterns (which are found on the Scottsdale website) and noted that they haven't changed much since the airport opened.

David Van Omen also stated that he had inquired about the state land near Tesoro and Encore. The state currently has no interest in either piece of land.

Operational Review Committee

Dick Zielinski reported that the committee had met recently to review whether we should consider making the covenants position full time part vs. part time. There have not been many applicants at the part time rate and the GCA staff and Operational Review Committee feel that we could accommodate a full time staff member addition.

Paul Alessio noted that with the age of the community and the amount of modifications being handled by staff, a full time covenants person would be helpful. Richard Zielinksi noted that we want to keep the white glove service and the more overloaded staff becomes the more difficult that will be.

Pat Seago noted that condo owners will have to pay the additional amount for the staff member although they will ultimately not benefit from the additional position, although she does understand that it is written into the CC&Rs that all owners must pay the same assessment regardless of benefit. Don Morse noted that although they will not directly benefit from the new staff member, the homes being taken care of throughout Grayhawk does ultimately help everyone with their home values.

A motion was made and approved to make the covenants position full time.

Don Morse stated that Assistant Community Manager Ashley Scott had been researching a new phone system for the GCA Office, as the system currently being used is over 12 years old. Some of the benefits of upgrading will include:

- Gate staff will be able to intercom the office (and vice versa)
- · Staff will be able to access their messages while away from the
- During an internet outage calls will be routed to a messaging service

The cost of the new service is slightly more, but the Association will be saving money on phone service, bringing the overall increase to just about \$15 per month. Bids were reviewed from ESI, Pacific Office and JLink.

A motion was made and approved to accept the proposed quote from ESI to upgrade the GCA office phone system.

It was also noted that Ashley Scott will be working on obtaining competitive bids for street sweeping in the Retreat Village.

Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that the committee did not meet.

DLC crews are currently promoting the growth of the summer Bermuda. Crews have also started summer flower change outs at the

monuments on Grayhawk Dr. and Scottsdale Rd.

The Pinnacle erosion project was completed, with rip rap installed around the perimeter of the park. A broken multiport landscape emitter was replaced at the medium on Thompson Peak Pkwy. (across from Starbucks).

DLC has also identified five culverts that are at least 50% full. The cost to cleanout the four culverts in the GCA is \$6,867.12 and the one in the RVA is \$1,930.50. These will be paid for from the Operating Budget.

DLC is also in process of identifying sidewalk panels that are broken or may be a trip hazard. As part of the contract, DLC replaces 10 panels per year at no cost, however, they will identify any additional panels as replacing them at the same time is more cost effective.

The Deer Valley drop basin must be pumped after heavy rains to prevent mosquito breeding. Copper State Engineering, the company that designed the structure, suggested installing a 12" PVC pipe drain at the bottom. DLC will install this drain at a cost of \$2,465.00, which will be paid from the Operating Budget.

Community Enhancement Committee

The Community Enhancement Committee met to review Condo Community Enhancement Program submittals.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$16,500.00 toward upgraded landscaping throughout the Venu, including granite and rip rap additions along 77th Way.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$14,963.81 for the addition of barrier gates at the entrance and exit of Encore.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$16,5000.00 toward key pad locks at the pedestrian gates and community center in Cachet, as well as upgrade community water features.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$16,500.00 to upgrade the drip system around six buildings in Village at Grayhawk.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$16,500.00 toward remodel the existing community library in Tesoro.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$16,500 toward upgrading the drip irrigation system around six buildings in Avian.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$16,5000 toward upgrading the access system in Vintage to RFID at the main entry and amenity spaces.

A motion was made and approved to pay \$16,250.00 to upgrade landscaping in the Edge to include xeriscape and additional rock features.

Event Planning Committee

Sarah Van Duyne reported that past events including the Movie in the Park and Food Truck night had been successful. Upcoming events include the Concert in the Park and Mother Son Nerf Wars.

Communications Committee

Jennifer Sheets reported that she and Stacey Harvey had met virtually with Keith Zolman with Studio KZ to discuss options for communicating the guardhouse remodel.

The committee has been working to finalize a shot list for the approved photographer to work with when she takes pictures at Grayhawk.







Architectural Review Committee

Paul Alessio reported that there were two meetings with a total of 32 submittals in April. Paul also noted that since taking over at the ARC staff liason, Ashley Scott has been doing a fantastic job.

Budget/Finance Committee

Jeanette Griswold reported that the committee did not meet.

Executive Committee

David Van Omen reported that the committee did not meet.

Stacey Harvey did note that a board presidents roundtable was recently held as a get-to-know-you as many Presidents are new to their role. David Van Omen (GCA) and Arlene Smith (RVA) were in attendance, along with seven of the eight condo presidents. The group already has plans to meet again in July.

New Business

A motion was made and approved to accept the proposed committee chair appointments.

A homeowner submitted a request to park a car in the street for two months due to family members being home for the summer.

A motion was made and approved to deny the homeowners request, as it is possible for them to fit all five vehicles in the garage and driveway.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer did not have financials to provide a report this month and will update in June.

Management Report

Stacey Harvey reported that the walls in the GCA Office were recently painted and new décor is being purchased to update the rental space.



Our Desert, Our Home

Agave Redux

A monthly column has its constraints. In this case, it is 1-2 pages and roughly 500-900 words. Throw in some photos and the choices involved in monthly storytelling are many.

Size and space prevent covering any desert plant's story in a single column. These fascinating flora are complex. There is so much to know that it is often necessary to circle back and pick up the threads left dangling from one month to the next.

So it is with last month's "Octopus Agave" and its novelty. But, here's the thing. The genus of Agaves is incredibly diverse. The 'Octopus' isn't just a one-off; its distinctiveness is a feature, not a bug. Let's dig into this a bit more.

In General

There are approximately 250 species of Agave. All are succulents. They range in size from 6 inches across to a whopping width of 8 feet. They have lifespans of 5 to 50 years; a few live to be 70 or 80. They share the same general form, growing from a central point outward.

Flower Towers

You'll recall that the 'Octopus' has a distinct spike-like flower stalk with no branching. Other Agave feature a candelabra shaped stalk (like the one shown here) that branches out as it grows up. Still others are 'intermediate', combining the two forms. In general, the larger the Agave, the taller the flower stalk, some reaching as tall as 25 feet in just a few weeks.





Leaf Color, Shape and Spines

Agaves come in every leaf color imaginable - deep, dark to bright apple green, shades of red, blue and gray along with bi-colors like the Media-Picta Agave pictured here.

Agaves' leaf shape follows a pattern - from the rosette growth outward but the similarity across the species ends there. Agave leaves can be almost grass-like in width like the Twin Flower (pictured here) or they can be as broad as 9"-11" across as in the Whale's Tongue species, pictured in the mural photo above.

Leaf Imprints or Not

One of the often overlooked and under-appreciated features of Agave is leaf imprints. Here again, there is wide variation from plant to plant, depending on the shape of the leaf. Each leaf becomes embossed because as the leaves grow and develop, they continue to be tightly wrapped until they're good and ready to make their debut. If the leaves are scalloped with many spines, like the close-up of an Americana Agave pictured here, the imprint will be evident on both the underside and topside of each leaf.

If the leaves have a smooth edge, the imprint will look more like a shadow. It is still evident, just a bit more subtle.





To Pup or Not to Pup?

Remember that all plants are hard-wired to reproduce. Some Agaves take this to extremes by pupping prolifically AND creating perfect clones of themselves on their flower stalks.

Other Agaves make us wait. The Queen Victoria is a perfect example. Pictured here, it is a slow-growing species. It doesn't pup and you're likely to wait as long as 25 years before it flowers. Then, it relies on its pollinators to set the stage for reproduction. These factors explain why these Agaves are so expensive.



Enhanced by Association

One of the tricky but fascinating things about desert plants is how they associate with other dissimilar plants. Agaves create beautiful associations with perennials and shrubs. The architectural form and shape of Agaves contrast beautifully with leafy blooming plants.

Deep red, yellow and purple flowers look like they were destined to share space with Agaves. When these flowering plants finish their bloom cycle, Agaves once again take center stage with their strong architectural shapes and will do so for decades to come.





Your Monarch Butterfly Garden Flutters On

Monarch butterflies are one of the most recognizable butterflies in the United States. Their bright orange, black and white wings make them easy to spot as they flutter from one plant to another.

Each year, millions of Monarch butterflies migrate from the United States and Canada to wintering locations in Mexico. Because this migratory trip takes several generations of Monarchs to complete, breeding grounds are essential along the way.

Unfortunately, Monarch butterfly habitats have declined in the last several years to make way for development. Modern agriculture practices also take a toll. Monarch Watch (a website dedicated to Monarch conservation) estimates that nearly 6,000 acres of Monarch habitat is destroyed each day.

In 2018, DLC Resources created a butterfly garden or "Monarch Waystation" in your Community at the request of the Grayhawk Landscape Committee. Because a vital component of the Monarch habitat is Desert Milkweed — the plants that the butterflies lay their eggs in and that their newly hatched larvae eat - we installed numerous Desert Milkweed (Asclepias subulata) plants to attract and assist these special insects.

Desert Milkweed — actually not a weed, as the name implies - is native to the Sonoran Desert and commonly used in landscapes. In fact, there are a few Milkweed plants around the Community Centers at Grayhawk. The plants are quite aesthetically stunning: a dense cluster of silvery grey-green stems that are virtually leafless; pale yellow flowers appear from spring until fall.

Once installed, Desert Milkweed plants need little ongoing care. They're a lowwater use plant and they don't require any pruning.

Working with the Landscape Committee, the butterfly garden was established in the greenbelt between 74th Street and Grayhawk Drive. Chosen because it already had existing shade, benches and nearby turf areas, the area is a perfect location for residents to be able to come out and observe the butterflies.

The garden contains about 50 Desert Milkweed plants that were set among existing plants. This allows for the Monarchs to lay their eggs in the Milkweed and then flutter to the nearby Chaste tree, a main food source, to collect nectar.


Recently, DLC's fabrication department created a new Butterfly Garden sign-at no cost to the Community- to replace the



former sign that was looking worn due to sun damage. This version includes a superior top layer to reduce fading. Our crews installed the new sign and the area looks refreshed and inviting once again.

We also planted more than 880 new plants throughout the Community during Grayhawk's annual spring planting, including Desert Milkweed, Mexican Bird of Paradise and Fairy Dusters. These colorful, flowering shrubs will supply valuable nectar and breeding areas for Monarch butterflies.

We're excited for the opportunity to help support beautiful and educational parks for Grayhawk residents to enjoy. It's an added bonus that the garden will help care for the environment and these exquisite butterflies.

Still Sweet and Salty

I try to eat healthy but have to admit that my favorite food is pizza. I have always wanted to learn how to make my own

pizza crust but it has been intimidating to me because there are so many varieties of dough recipes to choose from. I wanted it to be easy to make and taste delicious. Fortunately Steph's boyfriend happens to be a great cook and he offered to share his tried and true pizza crust recipe with me. He tops his crust with roasted tomatillo salsa, thin slices of red onion, goat cheese and crumbled crisp bacon and bakes it in a cast iron skillet. It looks delicious (photo below...email me if you want the specific recipe) but I have been

in the mood for traditional Pizza Margherita so I topped this crisp and chewy pizza crust with tomato sauce, mozzarella and basil. If you make the sauce, make sure you use San Marzano style canned tomatoes which are sweeter, less acidic and more flavorful.

I used to eat a lot of authentic wood-fired Pizza Margherita when I lived in



Switzerland and traveled to Italy. Pizza chefs in Italy love to tell the story behind the name "Pizza Margherita." If you haven't heard it before...Pizza Margherita was named in 1889 to honor the Queen of Italy, Margherita of Savoy, when she visited Naples. The pizza also represented the unification of Italy since the toppings are red (tomato), white (mozzarella) and green (basil) which are the colors of the Italian flag. Pomo's restaurant in Scottsdale makes a delicious authentic Pizza Margherita but when you feel like staying-in and making your own pizza I highly recommend this recipe. It was very easy to make and it will be my go-to pizza crust from now on. Buon appetito!

Pizza Margherita

Prep time: 20 minutes (plus 8-18 hours for dough

Cook time 20-25 minutes • Servings: 2

INGREDIENTS:

Crust (double if making two pizzas)

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon rapid-rise yeast
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup room-temperature water
- 1/3 cup light lager beer (I used Stella's)
- 2 tablespoons high quality olive oil (for oiling the pan and crust)

Sauce (enough for 2-3 pizzas, refrigerate leftover sauce for up to one week or freeze)

- 12 ounce can San Marzano crushed tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

- fresh mozzarella ball (not packed in water), sliced 1/4" thick
- 4-6 basil leaves, torn
- grated Parmigiano Reggiano (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Make the dough in a medium bowl mixing together flour, yeast and salt. Add water and beer. Stir to combine into a ball. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and let rise at room temperature for 8-18 hours.
- Make the sauce in a medium bowl by combining crushed tomatoes, olive oil, garlic, salt, pepper and sugar.
- Heat oven to 500 degrees if using cast iron skillet, 475 degrees if using baking sheet pan or pizza stone. Generously oil bottom and sides of skillet, pan, or stone. Use a rubber spatula to gently spread the dough until the dough forms an even circle. Sprinkle with extra flour if needed to stretch the dough.
- Brush the outside ½ inch edge of pizza crust dough with olive oil.
- 5. Spread approximately one cup of the sauce on the dough, leaving a ½ inch border with no sauce.
- 6. Bake for 10 minutes until crust is partially cooked.
- Add mozzarella cheese on top of the sauce.
- Bake an additional 10-15 minutes or until crust is golden and puffy and cheese is melted.
- Remove the pizza from oven and transfer to a cutting
- 10. Sprinkle with basil and grated Parmigiana Reggiano (optional) and cut into slices.

From previous June articles, maybe you will remember that I love this time of the year because it is the beginning of many birthday celebrations with my family. Thankfully this will be a great month to eat out now that most of our favorite restaurants have reopened to dine-in.

We seem to have visited a few breakfast places since January. Sorry! And here all the way along I thought Jenifer sheets like to go to breakfast places. Guess I don't know her as well as I thought LOL! But this one we just reviewed and ate is the last one on our list for a while. (told to use a while vs awhile in spell check)

We ventured out to High Street across from Desert Ridge to check out *The Boozy*, which has been open since last year. I have seen several great articles on it and was excited to check it out.

They pride themselves on being a from scratch kitchen, with a menu split between breakfast, lunch and (my favorite), drinks. Breakfast includes everything from breakfast kebabs to overnight waffles and French toast, benedicts and more. One of their most popular dishes is the Dirty Bird. It's their take on chicken and waffles with house-made waffles and breaded chicken covered with sausage gravy and a spicy maple syrup on the side.

With a name like "Boozy", there's also an emphasis on adult beverages. Diners can enjoy a Booze Bloody or one of the many flavors of mimosas, along with fun drinks like "Uggs Not Included" and "The Dude". They also have a great coffee menu.

For a breakfast spot, they had some great items on their lunch menu, and since we went a little bit later in the day, that was the direction I took. I ordered the *High St.* which was a Creekstone Angus beef patty, applewood bacon, tomato, grilled red onion, shredded lettuce, melted American cheese smothered in roasted garlic aioli. With the lunches you have a choice of regular French fries, sweet potato fries, house salad, fresh fruit or boozy potatoes. Naturally I ordered fries. They were waffle style fries and were very good. Don't usually add American cheese to my hamburgers, but it was good and added a completely different taste. The two slices

of applewood bacon were generous but I personally would have preferred them to be cooked a little more. The bun, which at many restaurants is not done right, was perfect.

Jennifer Sheets, my partner in crime and Director of Communications for GCA, ordered the *Slim N' Trim Bowl* under the bowl menu. It was marinated salmon, sautéed seasonal vegetables over quinoa drizzled with lemon sauce. The presentation was awesome. It was a generous serving of salmon on the top of veggies and quinoa.

There are a ton of great breakfast spots popping up around Grayhawk, and you can add **The Boozy** to your list of places you should try. The food was good, the atmosphere easy and fun and the service fantastic.
