Board Briefs

Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting – February 5, 2018

Development Committee

David Van Omen reported that HonorHealth has opened their facility in the former Bashas' location in the Grayhawk Plaza. Also, the Rawhide Wash floodplain project in the GCA's attempt to receive a Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) from FEMA to remove the western portion of Grayhawk from the Rawhide Wash floodplain and eliminate the flood insurance requirement for this area has been approved by the City of Scottsdale is proceeding with FEMA.

Operational Review Committee

Martha Troy reported that the school is planning to install motion sensor lights on the west side of the school. She noted that the City of Scottsdale curfew is 10:00 p.m. for children under the age of 15 and 12:00 a.m. for those 16-17 years old. This curfew must be enforced by the City of Scottsdale.

The committee recently toured the Talon and Raptor guardhouses and determined that they were poorly designed and overcrowded. The committee is planning to visit other community guardhouses for ideas before moving forward. Stacey Harvey noted that the remodel will likely have to wait until the summer of 2019 for minimal impact to residents.

Martha Troy reported that the committee would like to see

an article on regular home maintenance in an upcoming issue of the Grayhawk Flight.

A motion was made and approved to appoint Richard Zielinski to the Operational Review Committee.

Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that there have been leaks and breaks in the irrigation mainlines throughout the community. DLC Resources is currently working to find stuck or seeping valves, as they continue to see water movement when controllers are off. They will also add thrust blockers as we have experienced high water pressure in City of Scottsdale lines.

Community Enhancement Committee

Bob Mann reported that the committee did not meet.

Event Planning Committee

Margo Bellock reported that the Event Planning Committee would be sharing part of their February meeting with the Communications Committee to discuss charitable giving. They will also be evaluating their 2017 events to help better plan for the future.

Linda Shaw reported that the dates on the Strategic Planning document seemed close together and suggested that we spread them out over two years.

All eight of the condominium associations have submitted their 2018 project requests for the Condominium Community Enhancement Program.

The CC&R Amendment ballot has not seen a huge increase in votes over the past couple months. Voting will close on April 30.

Treasurer's Report

Jeanette Griswold reported that the water overage has hurt the budget and the GCA ended 2017 approximately \$20,000 over budget in the water expense.

Management Report

Michael Fee reported that DLC Resources is working on seasonal pruning.

The management team is in process of working with Communication Concepts to update the audio visual equipment in the Talon Room.

The Annual Meeting is being held on March 20. There are four applicants for the three open positions on the GCA Board of Directors and two applications for the two open positions on the RVA Board of Directors.

As I write this article, Valentine's Day is almost here as is the beginning of Lent. The month of February's temperatures

have been very spring-like. I hope these unseasonably warm days aren't an indication of what's in store for us this spring and summer! March is one of my favorite months, as it's the month for St. Patty celebrations, March Madness and Spring Training. We also have our Grayhawk Annual Meeting where we elect new members to the Board of Directors. Mark your calendars for Tuesday, March 20 at 6 p.m. at the Fairway House and join fellow neighbors as we determine the new leaders for the community. If nothing else, come for the great food and amazing prizes!

This is the time of year our weather in Arizona is the envy of nearly everyone else in the country. Many of us will be expecting guests and those people are going to need to eat. Home cooking is great, but we all know that showing off some of the area establishments is half the fun of having a houseguest. It leaves more time for us to enjoy ourselves and the company of friends and family.

This year I am going to try to step outside of my "Grayhawk bubble" and venture more than five miles from my home to eat. I know the Valley is full of great food and drinks! I kicked off my adventure this month as Grayhawk's Director of Communications Jennifer Sheets and I decided to visit **The Sicilian Butcher** for lunch. We were not disappointed.

The Sicilian Butcher was opened by the visionaries and operators of **Tomaso's Italian Restaurant, Tomaso's When in Rome**, and **Hash Kitchen**. With casual dine-in and to-go services, **The Sicilian Butcher** is a build-your-own meal experience with gourmet meatballs and Italian cured meats for charcuterie boards. Using family recipes, The Sicilian Butcher offers 15 craft meatball varieties including dry-aged steak, lamb, ahi tuna, lump crab and meatless/vegetarian choices such as lentil and eggplant parmigiana. The choose-your-own-meatball adventure offers eight sauce options such as garlic basil marinara, pesto trapanese, Parmigiano cream sauce, truffle mushroom, and spicy arrabiatta. Guests can mix or match their meatballs and add a Caesar salad, house-extruded pasta, bread for sandwiches, polenta or risotto.

The restaurant really specializes in craft meatballs, so Jennifer and I decided to order meatballs with no bottom (pasta). You can order the Bucket of Balls, but the five meatballs in the bucket are all the same kind and we wanted to be able to mix and match, for your benefit of course! Our server suggested that we do a flight like one might do with wines. All the meatballs are served in separate dishes and have the same sauce.

We ordered the popular *Tomaso's Sicilian Meatballs* with ground veal, prime beef, pork, pine nuts, raisins, pecorino cheese, garlic, and fresh herbs; Sausage with ground pork, aged provolone, fennel seeds, wine braised green onions, garlic, and calabrian chili; *Eggplant Parmballs* with roasted eggplant, basil, parmigiano cheese, fresh mozzarella, and herb bread crumbs; *Uncle Arthur N.Y. Meatballs* with ground lamb, ground beef, aged provolone, garlic, and fresh herbs; and the yummy very popular Lump Crab and Shrimp with garlic, meyer lemon, fresh herbs, whipped boursin cheese, and bread crumbs. They were served with the Marinara sauce which is made with San Marzano tomatoes, garlic, and basil. We ordered an Arrabiatta sauce (spicy marinara) as well.

We also ordered the *Arancini*, which are saffron rice balls, fresh mozzarella, meat ragu, and English peas. The *Arancini* was yummy and the meatballs were out of this world. They were huge! We were able to cut each meatball in half so we could both sample all of them. We both felt the Sicilian was a good "everyday" meatball and really enjoyed both sauces. The Arrabiatta was not nearly as spicy as I had anticipated.

What I think I liked most about **The Sicilian Butcher** was that the casual, family-style vibe I got there. It would be a great place for a brunch with the girls, a family dinner or a happy hour with friends. Speaking of happy hour, they have a great one! I was especially drawn to the bottle and board (house select wine and the polenta and meatball board) for \$19. Quite a few people ordered that board while we were there for lunch and it looked amazing!

Until next month, I leave you with some fun trivia. I am sure you noticed that Valentine Day and Ash Wednesday fell on the same day. The last time that happened was in 1945 and won't happen again until 2024. And guess what?? Easter and April Fool's day fall on Sunday, April 1. The last time they coincided was 1956 and next the time they both fall on the same day will be in 2029. See what happens when I research holidays and the month I am writing about? Happy Month of March.





Our Desert, Our Home

Great Desert Landscapes, Part III

Now that we have explored how to think about a landscape and the importance of hardscaping, berming and shaping, we're ready to dig into (pardon the pun) the plants. Here,

there is good news and bad news.

The good news is that we have a wider variety of plant types than any other climate in the US. The bad news is that we have a wider variety of plant types than any other climate in the US.

With trees, shrubs, succulents, cacti, vines, ground covers, annuals and perennials we have a ton of choices - probably too many for some of us. But, these choices allow us to create spectacular landscapes. Here are some guidelines that will help you create the landscape of your dreams.

Trees

Every great landscape begins with trees. In general, Grayhawk yards are pretty small. Still, well-placed desert trees provide shade and give your yard a "verticality" that is essential to the overall visual effect. If you're considering a landscape renovation, begin with your trees. Are they in the right locations? Do they create an ongoing mess near your pool (I'm talking about you, Palo Verdes!)? Do they provide enough shade throughout the year? Do your smaller trees provide the accent they should?

Trees serve to soften your landscape as well as provide shelter for the plants beneath them. They are also essential to the pollinators that work your yard. If all of that weren't enough, they also perform the mighty task of carbon sequestration.

I have six trees in my yard plus a tree-sized Spanish Dagger (Yucca). Each tree has a role in our overall landscape and with annual attention from an arborist, I'm confident of their ongoing contribution.

Think of your trees as a frame for the rest of your landscape. Begin with the corners of your back yard. Consider planting one tree in each and then move toward your patio. Are there places closer to the house where shade might be beneficial or where a smaller tree would provide a nice accent?

Begin your plant research with Landscape Plants for the Arizona Desert. This is a free publication and the GCA office has plenty of copies. Another useful booklet is Xeriscape: Landscaping with Style in the Arizona Desert, also free and available at the GCA office.

Shrubs

When landscaping with desert plants, it is essential that you not over-rely on a single plant type. Your landscape should include a variety of desert plants. Once your trees are in place, shrubs define the rest of the space. They soften the effect of spiny cacti and angular succulents. They can serve as a massed backdrop or, better yet, dotted throughout your landscape giving a repetitive continuity that is pleasing to the eye. And, they bloom in glorious colors throughout the year.

If you've been following this column for awhile, you know my bias for shrubs that grow wider than they do tall. To my eye, this is a more natural form and is a more pleasing compliment to cacti and succulents. My favorites are the Chihuahuan Sage, Valentine Bush, Blue Emu Bush (sometimes called Blue Bells) and Chuparosa. All of these shrubs are reliable performers and you can find them planted in the common areas throughout Grayhawk.

Though not exactly shrubs, Red Yuccas are another plant that grows wider than tall. Planting at least three of a single shrub in a given area is a great start. Plant three to five of them together to create a massed effect and you'll really look like you know what you're doing!

Another option is to put two of them together and plant the third a bit farther away but close enough to see all three at the same time. Remember, our desert shrubs are bloomers and when they bloom at the same time the overall effect is lovely.





Succulents

The world of desert succulents in infinitely varied. In the Sonoran Desert, we can borrow succulents from the world-over - so long as they can tolerate our increasingly hot summers.

Succulents come in a rainbow of colors, not all of them bloom, but their varying textures add a visual interest that cannot be matched by other plant types.



There are plenty of reliable native succulents: Agaves, Prickly Pears and Yuccas are all nearly bullet-proof.

Given the array of plants at our fingertips, identifying them can be tough, but here is where the Internet can be a big help. Take a photo of a plant with your phone. Go to Google and click on "Images". Click on the camera icon and download the photo of the plant. You will then be able to search the images Google provides and you should be able to identify the plant in your photo.

Perennials, Grasses and Vines - Oh My!

Once you have trees, shrubs and succulents, you're ready to fill in the gaps with colorful perennials, grasses and vines. Here is where Landscape Plants for the Arizona Desert comes in handy. Virtually every plant you'd want to consider in these categories is in this booklet along with a photo. Take this booklet with you to your favorite nursery and when you see a plant you don't recognize, you can look it up.



Where to Begin?

Start with the ideal locations for trees, even if you don't plant them right away. Then, (do I have your full attention?) start small. Focus on a corner or a particularly barren spot where you can introduce some shaping and some small boulders (the size you could carry in your hands). Get a few plants and while in their pots, move them around until you find an eye-pleasing combination. Then, (are you still listening?) check the plant descriptions on the tags to make sure that each plant will fit when it matures to its full size. If you have more plants than will fit, move on to another area of your yard. Or, if you bought your plants at Summer Winds Nursery, you can return those that you don't need.

Steph's Mediterranean Salad

I just love spending time in the kitchen with Steph. We divide and conquer the prep work and are always excited to enjoy our delish meal together afterwards. We love Mediterranean food so Steph came up with this

Mediterranean Salad recipe that has a few of our favorite things-veggies, hummus, and tzatziki, a traditional Greek yogurt sauce. This salad is packed with flavor and nutrition and won't leave you hungry like some salads might.

You can make your own hummus according to these directions, or you can save time by using your favorite store-bought brand. You will have plenty of leftover hummus and tzatziki the next day to dip your favorite cut veggies. The recipe for this Mediterranean Salad is really four recipes in one, but they are all very simple. You will notice that olive oil, lemon juice, and garlic are used often throughout this recipe as they are staples in the Mediterranean diet (yes, you will have garlic breath!).

The Mayo Clinic recommends eating a heart-healthy Mediterranean diet that consists of these basics: fruits, vegetables, whole grains, legumes and nuts with olive oil, herbs and spices to flavor. Red meat should be limited to no more than a few times a month, but fish and poultry are allowed 2-3 times per week. This diet also allows red wine in moderation, so grab your favorite person and a glass of wine and enjoy creating and enjoying this delicious salad together!



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Steph's Mediterranean Salad

Prep time: 30-40 minutes • Makes 2-3 salads

Ingredients:

- 2 chicken breasts
- 8 tablespoons olive oil (for chicken, hummus, fried chickpeas, tzatziki)
- Greek seasoning (we like Cavender's)
- garlic salt
- black pepper
- salt
- ¹/₂ cup feta cheese, crumbled

- 4-6 cups mixed organic lettuce greens
- 1 English cucumber, sliced in chunks
- 1 container cherry tomatoes, sliced in half
- 1/2 red onion, sliced thin
- 2 cups chick peas/garbanzo beans, drained & rinsed (1/2 for fried chickpeas; ½ for hummus)
- 4 cloves fresh garlic, peeled and pressed (for chicken, hummus & tzatziki)
- Juice of 1½ lemons (for chicken marinade, hummus & tzatziki)
- 1 cup plain Greek yogurt
- 3-4 green onions, chopped small
- 2 teaspoons fresh or dried dill
- Optional: Greek olives

Chicken:

- Rinse and cut uncooked chicken breasts into bite-sized pieces, sprinkle with Greek seasoning, then marinate in juice of ½ lemon and 2 cloves of pressed garlic for 5-10 minutes.
- 2. Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil in pan on med-high heat; add chicken & marinade to hot pan and sauté for 2-3 minutes, browning chicken, stirring constantly, reduce heat to low and continue to cook for 3 minutes or until fully cooked, set aside.

Seasoned Chickpeas:

- 1. Toss 1 cup chickpeas (drained and dried) with 1 teaspoon Greek seasoning and 1 teaspoon garlic salt.
- 2. Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil on med-high.
- 3. Saute chickpeas in oil for 1-2 minutes until golden, set aside.

Hummus: (optional, can use store-bought)

- Combine in blender or food processor: 1 cup drained chickpeas, 2 tablespoons olive oil, juice of ½ lemon, 1 clove pressed garlic, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-2 tablespoons water.
- 2. Blend all ingredients together in blender or food processor for 1 minute until smooth, set aside.

Tzatziki:

Mix together the following ingredients in bowl: yogurt, 1 clove pressed garlic, juice of ½ lemon, 2 tablespoons olive oil, 2 teaspoons dill, chopped green onions, 2 teaspoons salt, 15 grinds of fresh black pepper, set aside.

Plate salad as you like, or as pictured-it will taste great any way you arrange it! No salad dressing is required as the chicken, hummus and tzatziki are all the flavors your salad will need. Top with Greek olives if you like.

And always, always enjoy your time in the kitchen...this recipe takes a little longer than some salad recipes, so invite family into the kitchen and enjoy the process.
