# Manager's Corner



This month I thought I would write about the budgeting process and everything that the Budget/Finance Committee reviews and considers when they put together the annual budget for the Grayhawk and Retreat Village associations. The committee begins the budgeting process with the intention of keeping the assessment rate the same with no increase from the previous year. Unfortunately, this cannot always be achieved especially with the annual increases in the Arizona minimum wage rate through 2020 which has caused our landscaping and security/patrol expenses to increase so we can continue to have our contractors pay a competitive wage to ensure that they are hiring the best employees for their Grayhawk account.

Regarding assessments, the Board of Directors of the Grayhawk Community Association (GCA) and the Retreat Village Association (RVA) are very sensitive to keeping the association assessment rate(s) as competitive as possible while still maintaining our existing amenities and service level. The GCA and RVA Board of Directors are also aware while still maintaining our existing amenities and service level. The GCA and RVA Board of Directors are also aware that the Grayhawk homeowners who live in a condominium development also pay an additional assessment to their condominium association which is considerably greater than the GCA assessment rate. These issues have been their condominium association which is considerably greater than the development of the 2019 Grayhawk factored into the current discussions of the Budget/Finance Committee in the development of the 2019 Grayhawk Community Association and Retreat Village Association budgets, which will be presented to the GCA and RVA Board of Directors at the November Board meetings.

The current GCA monthly assessment is \$61.00 per month (\$183.00 per quarter) which reflects less than a 1.5% increase per year over the past 15 years. For those of you living in the Retreat Village, the current RVA assessment rate is \$83.00 per month (\$249.00 per quarter) which reflects approximately a 2.0% increase per year assessment rate is \$83.00 per month (\$249.00 per quarter) which reflects approximately a 2.0% increase per year over the same time period. As I have stated in past articles, your assessments are used to pay for a wide range of over the same time period. As I have stated in past articles, your assessments are used to pay for a wide range of services and expenses necessary to successfully run the Grayhawk Community Association and the Retreat Village services and expenses necessary to successfully run the future regarding the assessment rate but you can be Association. Difficult decisions may need to be made in the future regarding the assessment rate but you can be assured that the GCA and RVA Board of Directors are committed to keeping Grayhawk as one of the Valley's premier communities.

On another note, the Grayhawk Community Association and Retreat Village Association (RVA) Annual Meetings, which are held every year in March, will be here before you know it and it is not too early to begin thinking about running for election to the Board of Directors. We will be electing four members to the GCA Board of Directors and three members to the RVA Board of Directors. If you have questions regarding these elections or what is involved in serving on the Board of Directors, please feel free to contact me.

# Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting - October 1, 2018

#### **Development Committee**

David Van Omen reported that Parma Italian Roots has opened in the Grayhawk Plaza at Scottsdale Road and Grayhawk Drive. He also reported that Tavern Americana I the Hayden Peak Crossing shopping center on the SE corner of Hayden Road and Thompson Peak Parkeay has closed.

#### **Operational Review Committee**

Stacey Harvey reported that the committee did not meet.

#### Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that the committee did meet in September. The committee got a general overview of the day-to-day operations of DLC Resources and looked at several new proposals.

A motion was made and approved to pay for eight additional days for the Deer Valley Wash cleanup at a cost of \$9,888.00.

A motion was made and approved to replace 35 of the 40 trees lost during the 2018 monsoon season at a cost of \$9,471.00. All trees will be a 24" box and will include 16 Ironwoods, 11 Texas Ebonys and 8 Acacia Mulgas.

#### Community Enhancement Committee

Bob Mann reported that the committee did not meet.

#### **Event Planning Committee**

Sarah Van Duyne reported that events have started to pick up for the fall. The meditation series was fantastic and many in attendance asked if it could continue.

This year's Pumpkin Patch event will feature new activities including a blow up corn maze, mechanical pumpkin, wax hands and more.

The Grayhawk Night Out at the Fairmont Scottsdale Princess will be a welcome back event for new residents.

The Health and Wellness Jamboree is an event in place of Sunday in the Park this November. The event will feature similar activities to Sunday in the Park but with a healthy twist. Activities will include a revolving stage with Jazzercise, yoga, pilates and more as well as food samples, golf activities, and fun events for the children.



#### **Communications Committee**

Jennifer Sheets reported the recent issue of the Grayhawk Flight had featured an article on Grayhawk's new non-profit partner, Arizona Helping Hands. Articles will be featured throughout the year highlighting various aspects of the partnership.

Many residents have started to use the new website for event registration now that the initial payment and registration issues have been resolved.

#### Architectural Review Committee

Paul Alessio reported there was two meetings in September. The committee reviewed the monument sign stone sample and felt that the stone color was too light. Stacey Harvey reported that there had been a problem with the color mix and that she had asked the company to install a new sample with a slightly darker stone color.

#### **Budget/Finance Committee**

Jeanette Griswold reported that the committee had finalized their proposed budget. The proposal includes an increase, which is predominately to cover an additional maintenance staff member, increased cost in patrol services and additional landscaping costs.

A motion was made and approved to increase the GCA assessment by \$2 a month and to fund \$90,204 of the \$184,836 contribution to the reserve fund through the GCA community enhancement fund.

#### Executive Committee

Linda Shaw reported that there is a RVA Board vacancy due to Mitchell Cooper selling his house. Current issues being addressed by the committee include neighbor to neighbor issues involving string lights, wall damage and barking dogs.

The strategic goals being completed include the all-inclusive sporting/fitness event (Health and Wellness Jamboree), fire mitigation and an article on front yard landscaping.

#### Treasurer's Report

Jeanette Griswold reported that year to date the GCA has a surplus of \$44,300, however, this amount does not include additional costs for storm cleanup due to the monsoon rains. There was \$44,168 taken in by the community enhancement fund in August, bringing the total year to date to \$514,877.

#### Management Report

Michael Fee reported the holiday light installation is going to be starting soon so that lights are ready to be turned on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving.

The Rawhide Wash project is still moving along but is taking longer than anticipated.

# Holiday Decorating in Grayhawk

The "most wonderful time of the year" is fast approaching, which means it's time to pull out the wreaths and menorahs and start decorating! Grayhawk welcomes the display of holiday lights, inflatables and décor. In fact, residents celebrate your efforts on the Holiday Hayrides (see page 10 for registration information) when they "ooh and aah" while sipping hot chocolate and caroling on horse-drawn wagons.

Decorations can be up beginning Thanksgiving weekend and must be removed by January 31. Holiday decorations do not require approval. We do remind you to be neighborly and respectful with your decorations. If you are not quite sure where to start, we have a few tips:

• Start with a plan or theme in mind, and start out small. If you are a decorating novice, light just two or three items that will serve as focal points, then add to your display each year.

- Make sure to use lights and extension cords approved for outdoor use.
- Avoid old-fashioned nails, staples, screws, or hooks when mounting your display. Electrical tape is a quick and easy alternative. Clips, such as shingle tab or parapet clips, hold lights to surfaces by applying simple, safe pressure.
- Use timers to ensure your lights turn on and off, even when you aren't
- When in doubt, visit the Montevina neighborhood for ideas! They go all out and even host a Cocoa Hut each year, where they hand out cookies and hot cocoa in exchange for non-perishable food or monetary donations for St. Mary's Food Bank. Check the December issue of the Grayhawk Flight for a schedule if you plan to stop by.

When all of the presents are unwrapped and the mess remains, it's important to remember the proper way to dispose of trash and Christmas trees. If you have



bulk trash to dispose of, make sure to check the City of Scottsdale website for the collection schedule and remember to keep your bulk trash out of public view until no more than one week prior to first day in during the week of collection.

The City of Scottsdale also typically advertises Christmas tree recycling locations, which are normally open the second week in January. The city can also pick up your tree curbside during your regular brush and bulk collection week, however, trees may not be placed curbside any more than one week prior to the collection date. 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# Landscaping

# The Right Tool for the Job

The DLC Resources landscape professionals that take care of your common areas know exactly what tools to use for every job they do in your community. Having the best tool for the job makes everything go much more easily and efficiently. In your own backyard, occasional tree and shrub pruning are needed in order to maintain the look and health of your plants. Here are a few tools we recommend you have on hand for taking care of these routine tasks:



#### **REMOVING BRANCHES**

Bypass Loppers are a great option for tree pruning. They are long handled tools that have scissor-like blades at the end. They are best if used on branches that are *less than 1 inch* in thickness. We recommend bypass loppers over anvil loppers because the

bypass will slice a branch when its blades cross each other. Anvil loppers have a single blade that cuts by pressing the branch between the blade and a flat metal piece. They tend to crush branches, which can damage your tree or shrub.

Bypass Hand Pruners are another tool that can be used on smaller tree branches and shrubs. It should be used on branches that are *less than ¼ inch* in thickness. Bypass hand pruners look like miniature bypass loppers. They are sized perfectly to use with one hand for small cuts throughout your yard.

Handsaws should be used on branches *larger than* 1 *inch* in thickness. You can find a standard





handsaw in any garden department. Make sure that you don't try to use a wood-working saw for these kinds of projects. Handsaws are designed for trees and will perform much better because of their rounded shape and serrated blade. Handsaws should also always be used for branches that are dead, regardless of their width, because dead branches are tougher to cut than living ones.

#### **PRUNING**

Scissor Shears are long serrated scissors that can be used to give your hedges and shrubs a natural look. Gas or electric hedge trimmers can also be used on large projects or to speed up the pruning process. When using a power tool, make sure to pay extra attention to safety and follow instructions provided by your tool's manufacturer.

#### **TOOL MAINTENANCE**

Having the right tool won't do you any good if it's in poor condition. A few simple steps can help ensure your tools are always well-maintained and ready for work.

Keep your tools sharpened. Most tools can be easily sharpened with a file or can be taken to a professional. In the case of handsaws, it is often cheaper to simply replace your blade when it gets dull.

Also, keep your tools clean. If you are trimming a plant that has been infested by a parasitic organism like mistletoe or witch's broom, dip your cutters in rubbing alcohol between each cut. This will help prevent the spread of the parasite. Even if you're not trimming away parasitic plants, it's a good idea to wipe down your tools after each use.

To help protect your tools when they are not in use, utilize sheaths and holsters to cover the blades. This will also help prevent accidental cuts or injuries. For regular storage, keep your tools in dry spaces like the garage to prevent rust and damage. They shouldn't be left in the yard or exposed to the elements and moisture.



#### **TOOL SAFETY**

Regardless of the tools you use, there are precautions you should take to help keep yourself safe while landscaping your yard. Remember to always wear gloves and protective glasses. Make sure your glasses are specially made safety glasses and provide eye coverage and protection. Regular sunglasses will not do the trick. When trimming, it is safest to trim from ground level and to not trim anything over your head. For projects that require these actions, consider hiring a professional.

Her mom, Marie, would always welcome us with a smile and have warm banana bread waiting for us or some other freshly baked-good like apple cake or red cake. Marie was not only an amazing baker but she also made the most delicious Lebanese food such as tabbouli, grape leaves, cabbage rolls and homemade pita bread-authentic recipes handed down from her parents who were from Lebanon. Everyone was always welcome after school or to stay for dinner at Marie's home, even though she and her husband had six children of their own, there was always plenty of food made with love. I still pull out the old torn, smudged recipe that is over 30 years old when I bake this bread because it just warms my heart and reminds me of Marie.



This bread is crunchy on top, and soft and moist in the middle and it is best about 10 minutes after it comes out of the oven, if you can wait that long! It also makes a wonderful welcome gift for a new neighbor, or coffee klatch with a friend, or even if you want to make a loved one feel special after school. I've tried to make healthier substitutions using coconut sugar, and whole grain flour but it's just not as good. So from Marie's home, to ours, and now to yours...here is the best banana bread ever.

# Best Banana Bread Ever

#### Ingredients:

- ½ cup white sugar
- ½ cup dark brown sugar
- ½ cup butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

- 2 eggs
- 2 ½ mashed bananas (medium)
- 1 2/3 cups all purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ½ teaspoon salt

Prep time: 10 minutes; Bake time: 45-55 minutes

- ½ cup sour cream
- 2/3 cup pecan pieces (optional)
- Pam baking spray

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. In a large bowl mix sugar, eggs, butter and vanilla with mixer for about 1 minute.
- 3. Add bananas.
- 4. In separate bowl stir together flour, soda and salt.
- 5. Add flour mixture to the wet banana mixture using the mixer for about 1 minute.
- 6. Add sour cream and nuts and mix for 30 more seconds.
- 7. Spray a 6" x 9" loaf pan with Pam baking spray.
- 8. Using spatula transfer bread mixture to a loaf pan.
- 9. Bake for 45-55 minutes, or until a toothpick comes out clean.
- 10. Eat while warm and spread with butter (optional).

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# **Our Desert, Our Home**



### **Denizens of the Desert: Aloes**

Just shy of two years ago - March, 2017 to be exact - I wrote a column titled "In Praise of Aloes" in which I made the argument that Aloes can be a great winter antidote. Aloes typically

bloom in late winter and they serve as welcome harbingers of spring.

For that piece I focused on the wide variety of Aloe species. There are over 450 of them with more than 100 of these being commercially available. The size range of Aloes is enormous - from 6" to 60' at maturity. Most species require some shade from our summer heat but, once they've settled in, they require very little attention.

#### **Winter Color**

While Aloes are nearly bullet-proof plants with interesting forms, another reason for their popularity is their colorful, long-lasting blooms. It is difficult to appreciate the wide variety of bloom color and the different forms these plants take until you seem them side by side. So, let's take an Aloe bloom tour, shall we? We'll focus our attention on those plants that do well here and are available locally.

#### **Medicinal Aloe**

Our tour begins with the familiar Medicinal Aloe. Like all of the smaller Aloes, this one is equally happy planted in a pot or in the ground. It readily spreads through offsets or pups and can consume a large space if you let it. Controlling this spread is easy. Just remove the offsets when they're small. When in bloom, these plants





attract Hummingbirds, Gila Woodpeckers, and Cactus Wrens. Their flowers last long enough (4-6 weeks) to get us into spring and the riot of color our warmer weather brings. Find them at Lowe's for about \$5.

#### **Blue Elf Aloe**

I've written about the Blue Elf in several columns and they are worth mentioning again, here. I have a lot of these plants - most in the landscape and another bunch in a pot. They do equally well in both. This is a small species, growing in clusters of about 1' across with the leaves



reaching about 8-10" in height. Their coral flowers tower above the plants and are a lovely contrast to the blue/gray/foliage. You can get these at Lowe's, too - also for about \$5.







Unlike other Aloes, Red Hats bloom multiple times throughout the year. And, it seems, just when you think they're done, they'll fire up another bloom cycle. When viewed from the side, the flowers look like candy corn.



Something else that sets these apart from other Aloe species is their deep green foliage. So, even when they're not in bloom, they give the landscape a pop of that dark green color we crave.

Watch out with this one, though. They do NOT like afternoon summer sun. I planted mine in the shade of a tree that we later replaced. Until the replacement tree creates enough shade, I have to cover these with shade cloth throughout the summer to preserve their dark green color.

Interested? These can be found at a reputable nursery. Try Desert Foothills Gardens and Nursery in Cave Creek.

#### **Tree Aloe** (Aloe ferox)

This Aloe literally stands apart from the Aloe crowd because of its sheer size - 10' at maturity. The leaves get up to 3' long, producing a mammoth 6' spread. A closer look reveals dark brown spines on their leaf margins.



This Tree Aloe is at the Botanical Garden in a lovely shady spot. The surrounding trees give it just the right amount of sunlight. Note that the dead leaves have not been trimmed away from its trunk. These dead leaves form a protective petticoat, preventing the trunk from sun damage.

Note also the bottle-brush shape of the deep red flowers. These late winter blooms never fail to impress. And, in case you're wondering, this tree is about 6' tall. These plants can also be found at Desert Foothills Gardens and Nursery in Cave Creek.

#### Hummingbirds

All Aloes attract hummingbirds because of their tubular flowers. These are a perfect fit for hummingbirds in search of food.


If you have a hummingbird feeder, place it near your Aloes or any other tubular flowering plant like Chuparosa or Valentine Bush. Your hummingbirds will stay longer if they have multiple food sources. They will feed on one, then the other and often back again.

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
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
