Manager's Corner



Last October, the Board of Directors of the Grayhawk Community Association (GCA) and the Retreat Village Association (RVA) held a Strategic Planning Meeting to develop short-term and long-term goals for both associations, and to determine the best approach to continue

to keep Grayhawk as one of the state's premiere masterplanned communities. With the economy recently rebounding after years of slow growth, developers are beginning to once again build new master-planned communities in the Phoenix metro area, and new houses will be popping up all over the Valley, including in north Scottsdale.

I am sure you have noticed that there is plenty of vacant land very near the Grayhawk community, including the area east and west of Hayden Road north of the Loop 101 Freeway, and the area west of Scottsdale Road between Thompson Peak Parkway and Deer Valley Road. You may be aware that approximately 136 acres of the Crossroads East development project south of Grayhawk was sold last month to Nationwide Realty Investors. Nationwide Insurance is proposing to build a regional headquarters on this property which is located west of Hayden Road between Legacy Boulevard and the 101 Freeway. This parcel of property has also been approved for 1,200 - 1,600 new dwelling units (likely condominiums and apartments) and the GCA Board of Directors will continue to monitor any future issues and proposed development of this property.

When new residential developments are built in this area, many of the neighborhoods in Grayhawk may be close to 25 years old. The GCA and RVA Board of Directors is well aware that some home buyers looking

to purchase in north Scottsdale may be attracted to the idea of buying a brand new property in the general area of the Grayhawk community.

It is for that reason that the Board of Directors has been discussing and developing ways to continue to keep Grayhawk as a relevant and viable community in which to live, including the GCA Board's recent approval to update and refresh the community and neighborhood monument signs throughout Grayhawk. An established community like Grayhawk has many advantages over new developments including name recognition within the area, and existing community amenities including the Grayhawk Elementary School, El Dorado Private School, HonorHealth Scottsdale Thompson Peak Medical Center, two City of Scottsdale parks, two nationally recognized 18-hole championship golf courses, the Boys and Girls Club Thunderbirds Branch, two office complexes, and two shopping centers.

But most of all, Grayhawk has you! It is the residents of Grayhawk that make this community so special. The diverse demographic within Grayhawk truly makes this community like a small town. We have families with young children, families with teenagers, families with children who were young when they bought their house and are now in college or starting their careers, retirees, those nearing retirement, single individuals, seasonal residents, and many others. Finally, most of you have also taken great pride in your community and your home by continuing to maintain your property in a manner that makes you and your neighbors proud to call Grayhawk your home.

Grayhawk Master Association Board of Directors Meeting – September 10, 2018

Development Committee

David Van Omen reported that a 136 acre parcel in the Crossroads East development south of Grayhawk has been sold to Nationwide Insurance. This parcel is located west of Hayden Road between Legacy Boulevard and the 101 Freeway. It was also noted that a new Italian restaurant, Parma Italian Roots, will be moving into the old Cold Beer and Cheeseburgers location at the Grayhawk Plaza.

Operational Review Committee

Richard Zielinski reported that the committee did not meet.

Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that the committee did not meet. DLC Resources continues to work on routine maintenance throughout the community. The watering schedule has been reduced and mow heights have been lowered to prepare for overseeding.

DLC's arbor special projects crews have been working to remove the 39 stumps that remained from storm damage that occurred in July and August. The committee will be meeting soon to determine tree replacement priorities.

Community Enhancement Committee

Bob Mann reported that the committee did not meet.

Event Planning Committee

Linda Shaw reported that Sarah Van Duyne, along with a few Event Planning Committee members, had completed site visits at the four final organizations selected for an annual charitable partnership. The committee was presented with information on each organization and the recommendation of the smaller group, and all agreed on a partnership with Arizona Helping Hands, which provides basic needs to children in foster care in Arizona. Linda gave an overview of the organization for the Board of Directors.

Sarah Van Duyne reported that the Pinspiration String Art event was successful. Attendees were able to create their own string art to take home and proudly display. Many asked for similar classes in the future and Pinspiration said they are happy to come

The Superhero Breakfast Bash went extremely well. The J.W. Marriot did a fantastic job with the food and the characters were well received by all of the kids in attendance. Upcoming events include Just For Her: Football 101 and a meditation series with Joey Bellus of Premier Fitness.

Communications Committee

Jennifer Sheets reported that there are still some kinks being worked out on the new website. Unfortunately, most of the problems we're having seem to lie in the registration and payment process, which is a highly trafficked area of the website. Civic Plus support is working diligently to correct the issues.

Advertising is starting to pick back up as we approach the winter months.

Architectural Review Committee

Paul Alessio reported that there were two meetings in August and a total of 12 submittals.

The monument sign project is still in progress. The committee has been looking at new stone options and examples are currently on display at the Hayden Road monument.

Board members who had seen the stone samples shared that they were very pleased with the direction that the Architectural Review Committee had taken.

Budget/Finance Committee

Jeanette Griswold reported that the committee did not meet but will be meeting in September and October to discuss the 2019 GCA and RVA proposed operating budgets.

Executive Committee

Linda Shaw reported that the committee did not meet. The Strategic Plan updates and accomplishments were shared, including conclusion of the charitable partnership selection and progress on the monument sign.

New Business – GCA Holiday Light Proposal

Michael Fee presented a bid from Custom Holiday Lights for the 2018 holiday lights. In additional to major Grayhawk intersections, lighting will be added at the Tesoro front and back entrances and at the Encore entrance, as was previously approved by the Board of Directors. Also, additional lights have been added to the Venu entrance and the NE corner of Hayden Road and Thompson Peak Parkway during the past several years and those are included in this proposal. The proposal also includes decorating a tree or saguaro at 10 neighborhood monument signs, and adding more LED lights this year.

A motion was made and approved to pay Custom Holiday Lights \$45, 693.30 for the 2018 holiday lights.

Treasurer's Report

Jeanette Griswold reported that the July GCA financial report included the invoice for this year's tree trimming project which resulted in a deficit for the month, however, the GCA remains almost \$20,000 under budget for the year.

Management Report

Michael Fee reported that the Playground Police completed their initial inspection of the eight Grayhawk tot lots. Overall they look great, although bushings need to be replaced on some bridges and additional Sof' Fall manufactured wood fiber needs to be added in a few locations.



Front Yard Landscaping

By Roger Tornow, Landscape Architect and Architectural Review Committee Member

The goal of the landscape guidelines is to create a vibrant landscape that mimics the character and beauty of the natural plant compositions found in the surrounding Sonoran desert. This includes large shrubs to create screening and a transition from the vertical architecture to the horizontal ground plane, smaller shrubs to transition towards colorful ground cover plants that provide interest in the yard. Similar to the compositions found in the nearby desert, accent plants are used modestly to create year-around interest and texture in the landscape when other plants are not blooming. An entire yard of cactus dilutes the value they create as an accent and present an unnatural appearance when compared to the natural desert. These goals are applied to all front yards to create continuity and consistency from home to home throughout Grayhawk to create a uniform streetscape while the guidelines allow for more individualized, personal expression in the rear yards.

Golf Course Architect David Kahn and his wife Karen moved their family of four to Grayhawk in 2014. After some struggles, they had finally hit their stride. David, the cofounder of Jackson Kahn Design, was finding professional success having completed the renovation of Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course (now ranked 94th in GOLF's Top 100) and the original design of Bob Parsons's new 18-hole course at Scottsdale National and its accompanying Bad Little Nine.

Their daughters, Amelia and Makenzie, were born in 2010. They brought both the joy and challenges that young girls always do. Karen, previously an architect working on custom home designs, had put work on hold to raise her daughters. Near her second birthday, Amelia was diagnosed on the autism spectrum. Karen dedicated herself to finding the best programs and services to help Amelia through the diagnoses. Both girls were happy preschoolers.

Things started to change when the girls were in Kindergarten. Karen grew concerned about Amelia's eyesight and after a series of testing, the family was hit with devastating news. In early 2017, both girls were both diagnosed with juvenile Batten disease, an exceedingly rare neurological disorder for which there is no cure. The Kahn family started adapting to their daughters' changing needs, which meant modified school schedules and doctor appointments. Despite that, they do their best to create a normal life for their girls.

After receiving the girls' diagnosis, the Kahn family created The ForeBatten Foundation. ForeBatten's mission is to fund pioneering research and compassionately support the Batten community. They are driven by the hope that a treatment or cure can change the future for all children affected by Batten disease. Rare diseases like Batten do not receive the same government assistance as other, more prevalent diseases, so ForeBatten encourages parents and caring individuals who are not willing to accept the fate of children diagnosed with Batten disease.

The girls are now in 3rd grade at Grayhawk Elementary School. They have declining vision, but manage to do almost everything other kids can do. Amelia has a love for Karate, Jane Goodall and monkeys, and her sister Makenzie loves horseback riding, penguins and zebras.

As is with all of our residents, the Kahn Family is part of the Grayhawk Family. Many of you are probably wondering how you can help. Start by taking a look at **www.forebatten.org.** There, you can learn more about Batten disease and even donate to help fund research.



Crab Artichoke Stuffed Mushrooms

I love to have friends over to sample my new recipes, so I recently invited my tennis team to our home, which was a little intimidating because they are all adventurous foodies. They are great cooks, and about once a month we all meet up to try new dishes at a new restaurant. One of the appetizers I decided to make for my team was crab-stuffed mushrooms. I've never tried to make them before because I don't like artificial crab

meat, and I've never found lump crab meat in a grocery store that wasn't canned. But while I was shopping at Whole Foods, I found Pontchartrain lump crab meat (comes in a plastic container) near their fresh fish counter, and I was inspired! It would be so much easier than steaming crab legs and cracking/pulling out the meat.



Since I didn't have a recipe, I decided to blend all of my favorite things together and give it a try. I love crab. I love spinach and artichokes. How could these mushrooms not be delish? They turned out amazing! The stuffed mushrooms were cheesy, creamy, crabby and tasty and they held up well in the chafing dish for a few hours until they were gone. It is a hearty appetizer that was a hit with my foodie tennis team and will be a hit at any party, no matter the season or occasion.

And always, always, always be adventurous with your cooking... just mix together your favorite ingredients and you will likely come up with a new delicious recipe!

Crab Artichoke Stuffed Mushrooms

Prep time: 20 minutes

Ingredients:

- 8-10 large white stuffer mushrooms (lightly washed, and stems twisted out)
- 8 ounces Philadelphia cream cheese
- 10 ounces lump crab meat
- ½ cup parmesan cheese
- ½ cup Monterey jack cheese
- ½ cup mozzarella cheese (save half to top off mushrooms)
- 1/2 can quartered artichoke hearts (chopped finely)

- About 25 fresh spinach leaves (chopped finely)
- 3-4 green onions, white tops removed (chopped finely, save half for garnish)
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- Few dashes of Tabasco sauce
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 20 grinds fresh black pepper

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In large bowl, combine all four cheeses with crab, egg, artichoke hearts, garlic, spinach, green onions, mayonnaise, Worcestershire sauce, lemon juice, Tabasco, garlic salt and pepper.
- 2. Stuff mushrooms with mixture and transfer to a baking sheet, sprayed lightly with olive oil.
- 3. Top mushrooms with remaining mozzarella cheese and garnish with a few chopped green onions.
- 4. Bake until mushrooms are cooked and mixture is warmed through, approximately 25 minutes. Broil for an extra minute or two for browning, if desired.

Our Desert, Our Home

Denizens of the Desert: Cholla

I think I speak for all Cholla (pronounced CHOY-ya) when I say that they're tired of being dismissed, maligned and otherwise denigrated for being ugly and useless. While it may be that

these plants are an acquired taste, to know them is to appreciate them. So, let the appreciation begin, shall we? We shall!

Cholla spent many years categorized as a subgenus of the Prickly Pear (Opuntia - Latin for prickly). Both cacti grow in segments but their segments are quite different from one another. Prickly Pear have pads and Cholla segments are cylindrical. Now, at long last, these differences have received formal recognition with Cholla getting their own genus. Aptly, the new genus designation is Cylindropuntia. Well, of course, right?

The Myth of the Jumping Cholla

All Cholla have cylindrical segments that are, shall we say, weakly attached. Often referred to as "jumping cholla", the myth is that a cholla segment will literally jump from its host plant and imbed itself into the nearest unsuspecting sentient being. Dogs and humans should be wary of these plants but the plants are not capable of sending their segments flying.

The fact that the segments break off easily ensures the plant's survival. The downside is that when the segments attach themselves to skin, fur or clothing, they are difficult to remove. Wise hikers take a comb with them to easily remove a pesky segment.

There are approximately 35 species of Cholla - all of them native to the southwest, south-central US and northern Mexico. Unlike their Prickly Pear relatives, Cholla blossoms are often inconspicuous. Their full buds promise a lovely flower but the flowers themselves are generally disappointing.

Big but Manageable

Most species of Cholla get quite large and if you have a space away from foot traffic and browsing house pets, they can be pretty magnificent. The Staghorn Cholla, shown here, can reach 7' x 8'.

But, if you want to keep the plant smaller than that, pruning is easy. Just grab a set of tongs and a chef's knife. Wearing protective gloves, hold a segment with the tongs and cut it with the knife where the segments join. To propagate, set the segment(s) aside in the shade for 4-5 days and the replant into a pot or your landscape (using your trusty tongs).

One of my favorite Cholla actually grows into a tree-like shape that can reach 7' high by 10' wide. The Chain Fruit Cholla retains its fruit into long bead-like strings. Like other Cholla, this one blooms but, despite the plant's size, its flowers are sparse and really small. They are only about an inch across, but a vivid magenta. Again, this is a plant that requires ample space - away from foot traffic and curious house pets.

There are a couple of Cholla that might be a better fit for your landscape or in a pot. Pencil Cholla grow to a maximum 4' x 4'. Big, if never pruned, but if you've got a side yard, courtyard or patio that gets a lot of reflected heat, this might be your best bet.

Pencil Cholla are less imposing than their relatives and have segments just about the diameter of a pencil. They are prolific bloomers and, unlike other Cholla, their flowers contrast brightly with the cactus stems. Pale yellow with deep yellow centers, these cup-shaped flowers are really eye-catching.

Another smaller alternative is the Diamond Cholla - growing only to about 2' x 2'. These have masses of 2"-3" spines so, again, keep them away from foot traffic and curious house pets.

The Answer to Reflected Heat

As our summers grow ever-hotter, the Cholla genus may turn out to be a local hero. This is a set of plants that can really take the (reflected) heat. I've grappled with my side yard ever since I planted it and am slowly zeroing in on those plants that can tolerate five hours of direct-hit summer sun reflected off two masonry walls with a sidewalk in between.

I added two Pencil Cholla to this mix last fall and the early indications are that these are the right plants in the right spot. I'm pretty sure that's the definition of "landscape nirvana" and, for us plant geeks, it doesn't get any better than that!

Come back next month to learn more about another desert denizen: Aloes - these (largely) winter bloomers are just the pickme-up that our landscapes and pots need during the winter months.

Arizona Helping Hands is a non-profit organization providing basic essential needs to boys ands girls in foster care in Arizona. Founded 20 years ago, Arizona Helping Hands has the philosophy: do one good deed a day and don't' take credit for it.

With over 17,000 children in the foster care system in Arizona, Arizona Helping Hands certainly stays busy, providing a wide range of services and programs to satisfy a constant need.

"They really have ongoing needs that we as a community can help fill," said Lifestyle Director Sarah Van Duyne. "As a committee, we were really drawn to the fact that they have so many ways for residents of Grayhawk to get involved. If someone wants to support Arizona Helping Hands by volunteering, they can. If they want to do a donation drive, they can. If they simply want to support them financially, they can."

Arizona Helping Hands provides basic necessities for foster children, including beds, cribs, bed linens, diapers, wipes, gently used clothing and dream kits (personal care items). In addition, the offer a number of special programs for foster support, which are outlined below.

Birthday Dreams

Many children in foster care have never celebrated a birthday. Through Birthday Dreams, Arizona Helping Hands provides personalized birthday gift packages to guarantee every child has a celebration. They have already provided 1,670 gift packages in 2018.

Back to School

Through various partnerships, Arizona Helping Hands is able to provide backpacks filled with school supplies for students entering Kindergarten through 12th grade each year. In 2018, they have provided 6,700 backpacks to help foster children succeed in school.



Holiday Toy Drive

Every holiday season, Arizona Helping Hands provides toys, personal care items, clothing, etc. to individuals and organizations through partnerships with social service agencies, schools, hospitals, and through direct requests. These same toys will be used throughout the year to provide birthday, graduation and other important occasion gifts to children in foster care.

They are making the holidays joyful for children who may not otherwise have had a Happy Holiday.

Footlockers

In late 2017, Arizona Helping Hands launched Foster Footlockers, designed to ease the fears and concerns of the children who are in a group-home setting in Arizona. They have so many things to worry about and the safety of their personal belongings should not be one of them. The footlockers will be a way for children in foster group homes to store their personal belongings safely. In 2018 121 footlockers have been provided.

Licensing Safety Products

Arizona Helping Hands also provides fire extinguishers and other necessities required for approval to be a foster care home. These services are available to families completing their foster licensing process. They have provided over 690 products this year.

So what's next?




